LEAVES SHORTLY FOR FAR OFF INDIA

George W. Irving to go as a Missionary.

To Northern India Where he Will Labor—Travelling Secretary for the Students, Y. M. C. Association.

A noble band of graduates of McGill University will leave shortly to carry on missionary work in China and India. Those who are going are Messrs. A. W. Loohead, L. Mowat, H. J. Keith, Charles S. Patterson and George Irving, secretary of the McGill Y. M. C. A. Two of these gentlemen are shortly to be married to ladies who have passed through the Royal Victoria College, this bringing the total number of McGill graduates who are going to the Far East up to seven. Messrs Loohead and Mowat will leave for China in August, while Messrs Keith, Patterson and Irving will likely sail for India in October.

George Irving, B. A., the present secretary of the McGill Y. M. C. A., is a son of D. P. Irving, of Vernon River Bridge, Prince Edward Island. He graduated from the Faculty of Arts of McGill University in 1902. He has since occupied the position of secretary of the McGill Y. M. C. A., which position he also held for two years before he graduated. He was also president of the association for a year. Mr. Irving has already travelled a great deal. In 1901 he went to Geneva, Switzerland, as a provincial delegate to the International Grand Lodge I. O. G. T. He has also attended many conferences in the United States and Canada. While at college he successfully represented McGill in a debate with Toronto University. He lately supplied at the Dominion Church of Ottawa, in the absence of the pastor. He has been appointed to the position of travelling secretary of the students' Y. M. C. A. of northern India, with headquarters in Calcutta.—Montreal Witness.
