NEVER USE SCISSORS TO CUT FLOWER STEMS

In hot weather choose stiff-stemmed plants such as carnations, in preference to sweet peas, sunflowers, and so on for your rooms. Before arranging the flowers cut the stems under water and leave them to soak.

SEASONING CROCKERY AND KITCHEN UTENSILS

Crockery and kitchen utensils of all kinds will give much better service if they are seasoned before use. All enamelled ware should be stood in cold water and brought to the boil slowly; see that the enamel is completely immersed.

MINING

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, Sept. 13—The price average for the mining was practically unchanged at the close of Toronto exchange Saturday. A narrow loss in the gold was fully made up by the Miscellaneous Mines.

Changes were narrow aside from gains of 15 for McLeod Cocksbutt, 14 for Perron and 9 cents for Ded Lake and a loss of 11 for San Antonio.

Trade was quite active in Francoeur on a net loss of 3 cents, O'Brien dropped 19 East Malartic 6, pioneer 15 and Wright Har- greaves.

Currencies

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (CP) — Leading foreign currencies showed little change in terms of the United States dollar Saturday.

The French franc remained at its gold export point of 659 3-8 cents, unchanged from Friday.

The pound sterling yielded 1-8 of a cent to \$5.05 7-8, or just under the two-year peak registered Friday. The Canadian dollar closed at 91.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13 (CP) — Loss of 1-8 cent was shown Saturday on Montreal foreign exchange by pound sterling at \$5.05 21-32. The United States dollar at 1-3-2 per cent discount and the French franc at 6.58 cents remained stationary.

WASH FROM QUEEN MARY

There were remarkable scenes on Southsea beach today shortly after the Queen Mary had passed on her way to Southampton.

Hundreds of holiday-makers were caught napping by the heavy wash caused by the vessel. They had ignored the megaphoned warnings of beach officials to get farther back, and remained complacently seated as the Queen Mary passed.

Several minutes later a huge wave broke on the shore and people scattered in all directions in an effort to escape. Many of them got a drenching.

More than 200 deck chairs, many handbags, picnic baskets, articles of clothing, umbrellas, hats, and other belongings of people sitting on the beach were swept away.

A man waded in the water up to his armpits to rescue his wife's handbag which, it is said, contained \$50, and a woman lost a handbag in which was \$5, all the money she had.

For a long time afterwards people were wringing out their clothes and drying them on the beach, and attendants spent the rest of the afternoon trying to retrieve articles floating in the sea.
