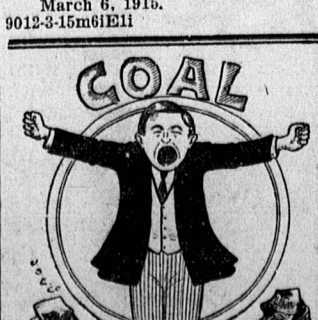

CANADIANS IN TRENCHES WANT "SMOKES" BADLY

LONDON, March 14.—One would imagine from a letter received from a Canadian officer serving with the Contingent in France that neither "Jack Johnson," the ubiquitous sniper, nor unceasing German bullets cause him and his men so much concern as the absence of cigarettes. "A smoke at night now is a great comfort, and it's hard to do without one," he writes; and then he adds, "Possibly we are not entitled to anything from the Imperial Government, or from British newspapers, but the Canadian Government has evidently not provided for us in this way."

He goes on to point out that English "Tommyes" get as many as 70 to 100 cigarettes per week, in addition to tobacco, while in their own particular case, for instance, twenty smokes is all they have received.

FACED PRUSSIAN GUARDS.

Ten days ago this Canadian company had the distinguished honor of being face to face with German crack regiment, the Prussian Guards. So close were they to one another that they could hear the "Boches" talking in their trenches, and hurling abusive epithets at their inveterate enemy, the British.

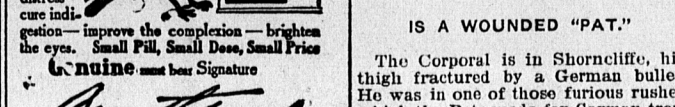
"They are splendid shots," writes the officer, "and are very cunning despite the fact that the peepholes in our trenches are concealed, they actually succeeded in firing through them time and again. The other day they tried to draw our fire and locate our sentry by clever display of dummy figures and had we fired our volleys would have been returned tenfold. This dodge, however, like many others, didn't work."

TO AND FROM THE TRENCHES.

He describes the journey to and from their locations in the trenches as one of the most dangerous experiences. In one case these Canadians have to pass some distance in full view of the German trenches, which are not more than 200 yards away, and although they come and go under the cover of darkness bullets whizz around them. The other night the company had only just emerged from the danger zone when the Germans turned a machine gun on it.

Major George Higginbotham, Toronto, operated on last week, is progressing splendidly. Shorncliffe hospital now contains fifty-five patients, which represents its full capacity. Most of these are Canadians.

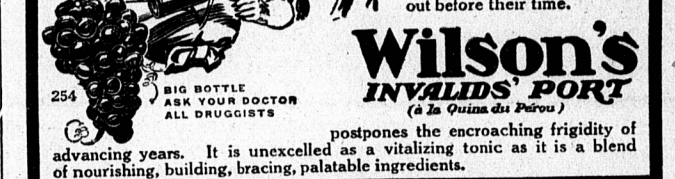
