# Prospects Better For Lumber Trade

 HALIFAX, Nov. 26—Nova Scotia lumber will find a steady market in Great Britain during 1934, according to James Smith of Smith, Tyler and Company, Liverpool and London lumber brokers.

Visiting Canada to confer with business associates, Mr. Smith declared the Old Country would be able to consume Nova Scotia's total output in 1933. Considerable new trade, he said, should be secured by W. Hart McL. Robertson, the Provincial Government's trade representative in Great Britain.

Shippers should beware against shipping timber of poor quality. Great care must be taken to ensure cargoes of sound quality, well finished and cut to the proper specifications. "If your manufacturers will bear these things in mind, they need not fear for a market," said Mr. Smith.

# PRODUCE

(Canadian Press)  
 MONTREAL, Nov. 26—Butter prices firmed slightly while eggs and cheese eased on the Montreal and produce market last week. Potatoes were also slightly firmer than the previous week's closing levels. The butter market ended the week at 2 1/2 to 20 cents a pound for No. 1 grade in Quebec, compared with the previous week's close of 20 1/2 to 20 cents a pound for the same grade. No butter boxes as against a total of 604 boxes in the previous week. No butter was exported during the week.

The fresh egg market declined 3 to 4 cents a dozen, graded shipments of Ontario and British Columbian eggs closed the week at 56 to 60 cents a dozen for A-grade, 40 to 41 cents for B-grade, and 36 to 37 cents for C-grade. Eggs in Ontario and Quebec closed last week at 56 cents for former and 57 cents for the latter. Arrivals amounted to 4277 boxes.

Potatoes continued the week at 60 to 70 cents per 80 lb. and bag of Quebec, 70 cents for New Brunswick grades in similar quantities and 90 cents for Prince Edward Island green mountain at 50 pound bags.

# ST. PETER'S CATHEDRAL

At the 11 o'clock Sung Eucharist yesterday the Rev. Canon Malbone was celebrant, and the Rev. Dr. Moore, President of the University of Kings College was the preacher, who took as his text the words "Thou therefore endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ," which are words written by St. Paul in his second Epistle to Timothy. Dr. Moore prefaced his sermon by giving a brief story of Kings College, and said he was glad to be back again in a pulpit which had always been open to him in the strenuous days of the campaign for the rebuilding and endowment of the old college and thanked the congregation for their long and continued interest in the college.

Of the hundred students now at the college 22 were studying for the ministry of the church, 20 are from Diocese of Nova Scotia and 12 from the Diocese of Fredericton.

The Rev. Canon Malbone preached at evensong.

Thursday next is the festival of Saint Andrew, Apostle, and martyr, and on that day a continuous chain of prayer will be kept by members of the congregation for the missionary work of the Church of England.

# THE BAPTIST CHURCH

At the morning service of the Baptist Church, which was broadcast by station CKCK, the Rev. A. C. Vincent, D.D., in the second of a series of sermons on the Christian armour, spoke of "The Girdle of Truth." "Stand therefore, having your loins girt about with truth," (Eph. 6, 14).

The Church meets times of stress and trying peoples and nations show a growing tendency toward a practical atheism. Christ is the truth, "I am the way, the truth and the life," said Thomas à Kempis, "without the truth there is no going, without the truth there is no knowing, without the life there is no living. God's word reveals the truth. We know Christ through the word, life and immortality are brought to light through the Word. Test your beliefs, your words, your actions by the revealing Word.

The usual week night activities were instigated and recognition made of the many letters of appreciation received from the radio congregation.

Dr. Moore then happily gave his guests a picture of the Kings College of 1928, when its total assets were just over one hundred thousand dollars, some old buildings, a divided constituency and a student body of 100 to whom as well as the college staff tribute was paid.

Dr. Moore then gave a number of his personal experiences during the campaign in search of funds for the college in Canada, England and the United States which were most interesting and appreciated.

On behalf of those present Mr. George DeBlas extended thanks to President Moore for his hospitality, and also paid a great tribute to him as a man, as a priest of the church and for his having undertaken and brought to a successful issue the campaign for the rebuilding and endowment of the Maritime College of the Church of England.
