**To Offset Birth Control**

(By Howard W. Blakeslee) (Associated Press Science Editor) NEW YORK, May 6—Wanted: a few millions of dollars to enable "high grade young people" to have all the babies they want. The idea is a scientific, social test, proposed to the society at the annual meeting today by its president, Dr. Ellsworth Huntington. Eugenics, the science which aims at producing better humans, has a long history, he said, but the parents from whom the improvement must come, are not limited to one class of society. They are in all classes, rich and poor and some need help. The time is ripe, he added, for a great experiment in birth control is reducing the numbers of children born to the heretofore prolific parents of "lower grade." Parents of "lower grade," he said, are of uncertain mental and economic handicaps. This fact reduces the competition of the "unfit," which has been the usual rule in the birth rate, and gives a chance of a race of supermen, if there is such a thing as to get started. The problem is how to know who is "high grade." A test is possible, said Dr. Huntington. "If two young parents have two small children, for example," he said, "it is possible to test the intellectual, physical and mental qualities not only of the parents and their immediate relatives, but also of the children. It is likewise possible to apply a number of well established methods of measuring the suitability of home training of children. Thus it is possible to decide that in a certain family the chances are large that further children will be of high quality."

**SUDDEN DEATH OF MARITIME C. N. E. OFFICIAL**

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 6—Morning paper carriers following quote—Arthur Fleming, Halifax, N. S., who arrived in Vancouver Saturday morning to attend the convention of the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen of America, died suddenly in hospital shortly before noon on Wednesday. He was taken to hospital immediately on his arrival in the city but failed to respond to treatment. Aged forty eight he was a C. N. E. employee in Halifax. Besides his wife Mrs. Fleming is survived by a large family in Halifax. The remains will be forwarded to Halifax today accompanied by a representative of the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen of America for interment.
