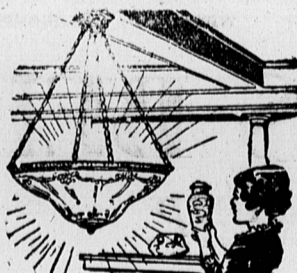

Dominion Income Tax Returns

This year the Dominion Government has imposed very heavy penalties upon persons sending in incorrect returns.

For instance:—If the income is understated up to one-tenth the real income the fine is 10 per cent interest on the deficiency.

If understated by more than 10 per cent but less than 20 per cent the fine is HALF THE AMOUNT OF INCOME OMITTED.

If the deficiency is 20 per cent or more, THE WHOLE OF THE UNREPORTED INCOME IS TAKEN.

A false statement may be punished with a \$10,000.00 fine and six months in jail.

If late in sending in return 25 per cent is added to tax.

You must not wait till asked for tax, nor leave the calculation of its amount to Government officials. You must ask for proper form.

All returns must be in by April 30th next, accompanied by at least one-fourth of actual tax reckoned liable for.

Take no chances. Your return must be perfectly accurate to avoid HEAVY PENALTIES. Do not delay. Attend to this important matter at once.

Government not Likely to Move

OTTAWA, March 30.—Government officials who could be reached tonight were doubtful that any application for the arrest of Grover Bergdoll, alleged United States draft evader, had been made by Canada, as reported in a Washington despatch today. At the Justice Department it was intimated that the matter of bringing Bergdoll back from Germany was probably one to be settled between Great Britain and the United States. Grover Bergdoll who has figured in recent despatches through the arrest of two American military police, who were alleged to have attempted to abduct him and carry him into occupied territory, was alleged to have escaped to Germany by means of a forged Canadian passport. According to the Under Secretary of State, if the alleged forging of the passport took place in Canada, this Government could requisition his arrest in Germany in the charge of forgery. Whether or not this had been done, the State Department official could not say. He had not noticed the name of Bergdoll on any requisition going through his hands recently, he stated, but was not certain that a requisition for Bergdoll's apprehension had not been made. The Prime Minister is Secretary of State for external affairs and would deal with any matter such as this. No information could be secured from that branch of the State Department tonight, however, as to whether or not an application had been made, as stated in the Washington despatch received in New York.

Cork Police Find Arms and Ammunition

CORK, Mar. 30.—The police last evening discovered in a dugout near Cork large stores of arms and ammunition among which were two elephant guns and quantities of bombs, mines, bayonet picks, a few rifles and revolvers, also documents of seditious literature.

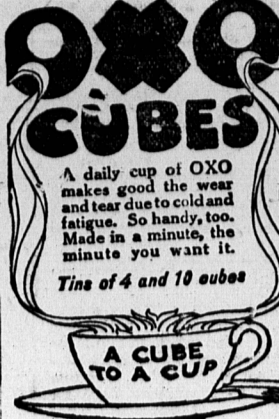

Merchant Marine Profitable Undertaking

OTTAWA, Mar. 30.—The gross revenue from the closed voyages of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine fleet during the year 1920 was \$10,927,422.77. Operating expenses \$8,735,917.22, leaving an operating profit on closed voyages during year of \$1,293,525.55. This was statement made to the House yesterday afternoon by Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Marine, in his account of the year's operations of the government owned steamers. Deducted \$695,065.46 for depreciation liabilities and incorporation expenses leaving a net earnings on closed voyages of \$598,460.09 to this was added \$183,000 net earnings on voyages closed since January applicable to 1920, bringing today's net earnings on steamships to \$781,460.09. This amount Mr. Ballantyne stated was equal to 2.35 per cent interest on notes given
