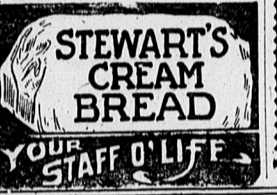

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 17.—Tulsa faces a threat of martial law today as the result of another kidnapping and flogging marked against its record.

Whether state action shall follow the latest case of mob activity is expected to depend upon the explanations made to Governor I. C. Walton by local authorities.

Informed of the abduction last night of Nathan Hantman Governor immediately telephoned Police Chief Moran and advised shortly after it took place, the him that he had heard that the police were involved. Chief Moran admitted that the executive declared he was seriously considering placing the county under martial law, but denied that the police had connived in the kidnapping.

Since placing Oklahoma county under martial law several months ago, with the announced intention of stamping out lawless activities of mobs, Governor Walton repeatedly has declared that he was ready to place every county in the state under military rule if necessary.

Hantman, said to be of Jewish extraction, was seized by unmasked men in Main street, within a block of the police station, and taken in an automobile into the country, where he was lashed with a blacksnake whip.

Hantman was brought to a local hospital, where his condition is said to be serious.

New Clinic for Unruly Children

CHICAGO, Aug. 17.—A clinic for unruly children the second of its kind in the world, will be established at Rush Medical College here, according to Dr. C. G. Grulle, head of the children's department of the school.

"There is too much mother in the modern family," declared Dr. Grulle. "That is the reason unruly children in American homes are more numerous than ever before. In former days families were large. Nowadays when we have one and two children in a family the youngsters get too much attention. They become self-centred and consequently unruly. Pity the only child. He is the product of modern civilization, and he is a social and medical problem."

The new clinic at Rush will specialize in neurotic children between the ages of 3 and 14 years. Its nurses and physicians will investigate home conditions first. In a majority of cases, they say the trouble is not with the child, but with the home. Nine times out of ten he has developed and exaggerated ego. He has been petted too much.

"If you get at a child's environment you change his whole life," said Dr. Grulle. "Small families are bad for children. If they spend a short time in the company of other children they get their minds off themselves and are cured completely."

The cause of undernourishment usually is this same exaggerated ego. When a child stops eating or eats sparingly, he soon learns that the whole family is upset. He enjoys being the centre of interest. "The behavioristic clinic has as
