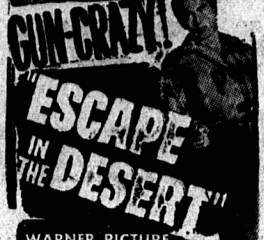

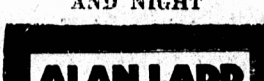

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\$2,000,000 Peace Thankoffering Fund From Presbyterians

The Presbyterian Church in Canada hopes to raise a Peace Thankoffering Fund of \$2,000,000 in order that all branches of its Work may be properly equipped, it was announced today by the Rev. Wilfred F. Butcher, Secretary of the Presbyterian Thankoffering for Christ, and Peace.

The Fund will be used to provide new churches and other buildings in Canada and overseas, sum to aid in the reconstruction of European Protestant churches; to open steps in missionary activity; to strengthen the theological colleges; increase in the capital of the Pension Fund; and other aid for aged ministers.

There are many signs that the Presbyterian Church is now prepared to advance in all its activity, and it is planned to relate the Peace Thankoffering Fund to the whole onward movement of the Church.

The Rev. Wilfred F. Butcher, Secretary of the "Advance", has recently returned from overseas, where he served in the Canadian Forces of the R.C.A.F. in England and the Mediterranean. He has held charges at St. John's, Newfoundland, and is a graduate of the University of Manitoba, and of Knox College, Toronto.
