Miss Edna Harris, Charlottetown, has returned from a visit to friends in Summerside.

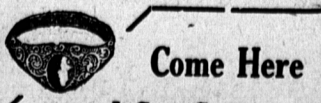

**THE ICE BOATS.**—7 boats left Cape Traverse yesterday morning at 6.30 with 36 sacks mail, 2 passengers, and arrived in Cape Tormentine at 6.40 with 61 sacks mail, no passengers and arrived in Cape Traverse at 10.30. The mail train from Cape Traverse arrived in Charlottetown at 1 p. m. and left again on return to the Capes at 8.45 p. m.

**THE STEAMERS.**—The Earl Grey which left Georgetown yesterday morning at 7 o'clock arrived in Pictou at 10.45 with 34 passengers, 40 tons freight and 10 sacks mail. The Minto left Pictou at 7 with 50 tons freight, 78 sacks mail and 55 passengers and arrived in Georgetown at 11.30. The mail special from Georgetown arrived in Charlottetown at 2.20 p. m. and left on return again at 7.30.
