FOR THE MINISTRY—The summer school of missions held in Free-town, P. E. I., was a decided success, several young people having decided to offer for the ministry and the work under the W. M. S. Revs. Geo. Morris, B. A., J. M. Rice, B. A., Gilbert Earl, H. H. Irish, B. A., and Rev. Geo. Steele, D. D., are to be congratulated on the good accomplished, and com- mended for the interesting, instructive and helpful work they have done.

Major General Benson, General Officer Commanding Maritime Division No. 6, with Lieut. Colonel Armstrong, District Assistant Adjutant and Quar- ter Master General arrived in the City from Halifax on Monday evening and inspected No. 5 Siege Battery yester- day forenoon at Victoria Park. The Battery appeared in full strength and were put through infantry and gun drill; signallers and observers classes being also inspected.

The inspection at the Park com- menced at 8.30 a. m., and continued until 11 o'clock.

Upon returning to the barracks the quarters were inspected.

The drill was exceptionally good, the men going through the various movements and handling the guns in a manner which showed that they have been splendidly trained in the comparatively short time in which they have been under arms.

The inspecting officers having com- pleted their work in Charlottetown left by the Western train for Sum- merside.

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GRAVEL PIT—The Dominion Government has purchased from Mr. Alexander Stewart, Dunstaffnage, a tract of land in which there is a splendid gravel bed which is being used for ballasting the tracks at Carleton Point. The gravel is of a superior quality and is being shipped daily to Carleton Point. There are excellent facilities for being loaded in a few minutes. A spur line connects the gravel pit with the main railway at Sutfolk.

GOOD RECORD FOR SERVICE—The Gregory family of St. Peter's Road, Charlottetown, have an excellent record. Sergt. Percy Gregory is now at the front doing his bit in defence of the Empire. His brother Oliver and Seymour Ernest, caretaker of the Peoples' Cemetery have enlisted in the 5th Siege Battery reinforcements. Sergt. John W. Gregory, another brother served through the South African campaign. Seymour while engaged in military service in Halifax held good positions such as orderly for General Cotton. These young men are sons of Mr. Samuel Gregory.

The death occurred at Clifton, New London, on Monday evening, Aug. 28th after a long and painful illness of Miss Ellen MacKay, daughter of the late Alexander MacKay, aged sixty-two years. In the passing away of Miss MacKay, a life of more than usual beauty and usefulness, has closed.
