PANIC FOLLOWED TERRIFIC EXPLOSION

One of the Union Metallic Cartridge Co's Buildings at Bridgeport Blown Up, and Three Men Were Instantly Killed.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., April 4.—In a terrific explosion which blew to pieces one of the brick buildings of the Union Metallic Cartridge Co's works in Barnum Avenue, shortly before the close of the day's work today, three men were instantly killed, and in the panic which followed women fainted and made frantic efforts to get within the walls surrounding the plant, as it was reported that many more lives were lost than really were. Such a scene of wild excitement this city has seldom witnessed, and the apparent horror of the situation was increased by the breaking out of fire and the appearance of

ambulances and morgue wagons, which rattled up to the factory and awaited the gruesome errand.
A few moments after the explosion occurred the fire department arrived on the scene and did good work in checking the flames. The exact cause of the explosion may never be known, as the only man in the building at the time, John N. Eary, was blown through the roof, thirty feet, with a great mass of debris, and came down dead. Two helpers, Michael Hurley and William Baylis working near the building also were killed. The building in which the explosion occurred was known as the dry house, and it was used to dry prime caps. These caps are flaminated and are brought out of the dry house and placed on long steam pipes. In some manner one of the caps was discharged and the explosion followed.
Nearly every pane of glass in a number of the buildings comprising the Cartridge Company's group was broken, the foundations of nearly every building was broken, as by a small earthquake, and the explosion was felt in houses within a radius of a mile of the ill-fated building. In the various buildings on the Cartridge Company plant there are 1000 employees and all were working when the explosion occurred.
Some of the working men and women saw the building shoot up in the air and made a rush for the doors. Falling glass on all sides told of something serious, and in a few moments the entire working force was in the yard in an excited condition, but order was restored when the situation was finally taken in. Several of the women of the factory fainted in the early excitement and were taken to their homes in carriages and ambulances.

Outside of the factory walls crowds of people congregated hundreds of men and women whose relations were working in the mills. There was great excitement but the police and firemen handled the crowds well. Careful search of the ruins tonight failed to reveal any further deaths.
Supt. Ryland said tonight that the loss to the Company would reach fully \$300,000. The dry house was of brick and was one and a half stories high. It was in a cluster of brick buildings. Windows in the factory of Eaton, Coe and Burnham a mile and a half from the explosion were broken.

GERMANY REACHING IN MEDITERRANEAN

But She Has No Coast Line There—Covets a Sphere Thus Far Controlled by Great Britain, Italy, Spain and France.

PARIS, April 5.—Germany's advent in the Mediterranean, as shown by Emperor William's visit to Morocco and Chancellor Von Buelow's speech, are the absorbing questions of the day. Heretofore France has dealt with Germany on the north, but now for the first time Germany makes her appearance in the south, and asserts that she has strong interests in the territory bordering on the Mediterranean. The Latin nations, Italy, Spain and France have thus far considered the Mediterranean as their special sphere of activity, although Great Britain's control of the Suez gateways, Gibraltar and Senegal, gives her a commanding position in the Mediterranean. Naturally, therefore, Germany's appearance in this exclusive field is unexpected. The fact that Germany has no coast line on the Mediterranean, while Latin nations have extensive coasts, lends additional significance to Germany's

entering the Mediterranean.
The sequel to the present complication arouses considerable solicitude. It is maintained that Germany's claim to have the open door indefinitely prolonged would result in giving Germany commercial privileges exceeding those of the other powers, and that it would probably lead other powers to ask for a similar indefinite extension of the open door, thus requiring Morocco to surrender her commerce without any return. Therefore the policy of France seems to be to give Germany adequate assurances of the same treatment in Morocco as the rest of the world, but no privileges beyond those heretofore accorded to the other powers.
Beneath dignified external calm considerable irritation prevails in Government quarters here. This, however, does not show a menacing tone. The attitude of the press also is free from menace.

THE LAWSUIT OVER WHO OWNED THE PEARL

Restaurant Man who Sold the Oysters Said it Was His—But the Man Who Paid for the Bivalves is the Real Owner.

HAMBURG, April 5.—The Supreme Court here rendered a decision in the case of the pearl valued at over \$750 found in her mouth by a woman, who, accompanied by a male escort, was eating oysters in a restaurant. The woman claimed the pearl and her escort supported her claim, but the proprietor of the restaurant sued to recover the pearl on the ground that shells like chicken bones, were by tradition left by the customers and were a source of profit to the proprietor. The

court decided that the pearl did not belong to the woman who found it nor to the proprietor of the restaurant, but to the man who paid for the oysters. In rendering its decision the court pointed out that if the ownership of the pearl were to repose in the restaurant proprietor instead of the person who paid for the oysters, then his ownership might as well be carried back to the oyster dealers who supplied the restaurant proprietor with the oysters, and thence to the fisherman who took the pearl oyster from its bed.

KING EDWARD SEES THE LARGEST DIAMOND

The Inspection was Made at Cost of \$725, Premium on a Special Insurance Issued.

LONDON, April 6.—The world's biggest diamond cost 75 cents carriage from South Africa to London, but to carry it from a safe in the Standard Bank here where it was deposited, to Buckingham Palace, for the King's inspection, cost \$725, that amount being paid as premium on a special insurance policy for its safe passage from the custody of the bank.
The packet containing the diamond was mailed in the ordinary way and sent with the rest of the registered packets, without any special precaution, from the Premier Mine to London, and it was delivered by the usual postman at Messrs. Neuman's office, in the course of his regular round, with a satchel full of other letters.

Parcels of precious stones almost as valuable as the Cullinan diamond which is estimated to be worth \$5,000,000, often are sent through the post the same way.
King Edward wished to have the stone taken to his private apartments by a court official, but its custodian, who took it to the palace, respectfully refused to allow it out of his sight. The King was much amused and called his entourage on the suspicion evidently entertained of their honesty.
"It is a great curiosity," he said to the custodian, after examining it carefully and holding it to different lights to make it flash "but I should have kicked it aside as a lump of common glass if I had seen it in the road."


