## THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

REGULAR meeting Mount Lebanon Lodge this evening. Work in second degree.

The bachelor will be at home in Ludlow Hall this evening. The regular night has been changed from Thursday to Tuesday.

A REGULARLY and affair strangely without fatal result happened at St. Eleanor's early yesterday morning. A woman named Arsenault on being missing from her home, where were left two young children, a search was made and her foot tracks traced to an old well on the property of A. E. Holland some distance from her residence. A lantern was lowered in the well and its rays disclosed the figure of the woman at the bottom, a depth of about forty feet. She had probably been there about two hours. Occasionally she would murmur in answer to the calls from those above. A ladder was lowered and a man sent down to assist the unfortunate woman who with little help walked up the ladder. When taken to her home it was found that the woman was slightly bruised but no bones broken. She did not appear to clearly remember what had happened. A little mystery surrounds the affair but no foul play is suspected. The husband of the woman is at present off the island.

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last night with the full board present. The auditors of the town accounts not having their work quite completed the usual yearly statements were not submitted. Murdoch McLeod complained to the council of the road leading to his residence at the North West end of the town not being kept broken during winter. On motion Mr. McLeod was voted \$5 for keeping it clear. On motion of Councillor Bowness seconded by Councillor Sobey it was ordered that the owners or occupants of property on both sides of Water Street from the eastern railway crossing to the western railway crossing and those on Central Street up to the Market House be requested to keep their sidewalks clear of snow. An amendment moved that the street overseer be ordered to engage men to do the work was defeated. On motion of Councillor Moore it was ordered that \$2,500 of the town's revenue be placed on special deposit in the Royal Bank of Canada until required for snow purposes. On motion the police were instructed not to allow chairs to be placed in the aisles of Market Hall. This was done on the suggestion of Councillor Bowness who drew the Council's attention to the danger in case of fire. It was also suggested that the main stairway of the hall enter from the south end instead of the east and west side so as to make a direct entrance or exit to and from the hall, but the matter was laid over pending a report of the probable cost. Council adjourned to meet Friday evening.

## CLOSING HOURS OF CITY COUNCIL

future. I am sure the Chairman of Finance will congratulate the Street Committee, as not only last year after deducting the amount of material sold from the street department we spent something over three hundred dollars less than was put on the estimates and this year our net expenditure is \$6,912.20. This excludes \$42.04 spent upon Boston Street drain, on Gillen's drain \$81.00 and new water cart \$390.00. Those amounts should not be charged to the street account. The amount paid for wages to city laborers \$7,855.72, leaving amount spent for material for macadam and ordinary work, \$9,367.81.

In conclusion let me say the city is to be congratulated on having as surveyor a man of Mr. Nicholson's ability not only as an engineer but a man who sees business for the city as he would do it for himself. I am doubtful if there is another City Surveyor in Canada that looks as well after the interest of the municipality's welfare as Mr. Nicholson looks after Charlottetown.

Coun. Stewart, Chairman of the Police Committee, in giving his report said the Police Force last year was efficient and the new officers were among the best. He urged the securing of a patrol wagon to prevent disgraceful scenes frequently during arrests. \$880 was collected from ordinary fines against \$500 in 1922. There was an increase of about \$1400 in Prohibition fines. The costs in the Police Court were \$374 against \$290 in 1922. The total collections were \$6,329.12. Deducting the amount paid to Government on Prohibition fines leaves \$4,500 paid to the city by the court.

Coun. Hooper, Chairman of Public Property Committee, reported that the work on Powall wharf was completed. Some dredging remained to be done however. On Government pond \$650 out of \$1000 was expended and the work was now completed. The fountain on St. George street was now satisfactory to everyone. The public property committee had been very careful and left a balance of over \$300. The work on the market was progressing very favorably.

Coun. Lyons in an eloquent speech referred to the satisfactory work in all the departments and especially to the City Clerk and to the City Collector, Mr. Vanderstine. He eulogised the work of Coun. Paton on the streets. During the past few years there has been an epoch in the improvements in the city. It must be gratifying to all to have such heads of departments as Couns. Whear, Paton, Stewart and Hooper. Future Councils must be progressive and look forward and advance. He spoke in high praise of the quiet dignity in which Mayor Warburton had conducted his duties during his occupancy of the position of Chief Magistrate of the city.

Coun. Moore, Assistant Fire Chief, reported that the apparatus was all in an efficient state. He spoke of the work done by the Council during the past two years and the pleasant days spent in the Council.

Coun. Whear, chairman of the Fire Board, said the Fire Department was highly efficient in all respects the only necessity being a new hook and ladder wagon and new ladders. He regretted the retirement of Coun Lyons whose services were appreciated by the entire city.

Coun Stewart eulogised the Fire Board that would compare more than favorably to any in Canada. The time is near when they should obtain more than the small salary they do at present. While the insurance companies are crying for higher rates he understood one agent had received a bonus of \$1000 from his company for the small number of fires. If the company was grateful this should have been given to the firemen.

Coun. Clarke spoke of the pleasant relations during the past two years. He was sure every citizen regretted the retirement of Mayor Warburton as well as the retirement of Couns. Whear and Lyons. The civic officials are all valuable men and could hardly be replaced.

Coun. Grant thanked all the Mayor, the Councillors and all the officials for their courtesies during the year.

Couns. Clarke and Moore asked for incandescent lights at the corners of G. A. and Cumberland and at Edward and Kent. Granted.

A request for an increase of pay from Police Officers Walker and Higgins to place them on an equality with the other officers was carried. A request for \$50 in crease by the Clerk of the Police Court was also granted.

E. Bayfield Williams representing Neil McNeill, butcher, asked that the latter be allowed to retain the lean-to on the west end of the Market shack. The matter was allowed to stand.

Coun. Paton gave notice that he would introduce a by-law to amend the snow by-law with regard to the levelling of the snow.

Coun Stewart intimated that the electric inspector by-law would be introduced at a special meeting shortly.

Coun Whear suggested the appointing of a temporary inspector who would inspect churches, factories etc. where the loss to the insurance companies in case of fire would be great.

Coun Moore was glad to see the Council coming out for an Inspector for which he has agitated for a long time.

Coun Hooper eulogised the retiring Mayor and spoke of the pleasant relations. Should he come back he would miss the retiring councillors and Mayor. He had hoped that all the councillors would "stand by the ship" till the new market is completed.

Coun Paton spoke in terms of high praise of Coun Lyons, Mayor Warburton, Coun Whear and the other Councillors who had made the board so pleasant. After further remarks by Coun Lyons and the Mayor the last important and most harmonious meeting of the present council came to a close.
