Battle For Final Berths In Golf Tourney Today

Charlottetown Boy Still In Running For Maritime Golf Title As Field Narrows To Four Players.

CHARLOTTETOWN, August 9.—A Sydney boy playing in his first tournament; a Charlottetown player who knows the course like the back of his hand; a Charlottetown veteran of Maritime play, who will battle it out tomorrow for final berths in the titular meet of the eastern provinces.

When year old Allan Findlay of the Langan Club, Sydney, won his way to the semi-finals with victories over Earle Turner, the highly rated Fredericton professor, the first round, and Fred Risteen, also of Fredericton, in the second. The margins were 3 and 2; 2 and 1.

Arnold Taylor of Charlottetown, who held the Island title last year, eliminated Frank Lewis of Truro and 1 and went on to beat Pete Kelly, Abegweit hockey boy and former Montreal Royal, one up in the quarter finals.

The possibility of a father and son final was washed out as young Bob Lamy, Amherst boy who has played in five tournaments, beat P. Findlay, father of Allan, 5 and 4 in the second round. Previously he had taken the measure of G. G. Hughes, of the home course, 2 and 1.

Tom Armstrong of Saint John's Riverside Club was carried to the green, but finally won out over Charlie McKinnon, who made gains but losing uphill fight to win Charlottetown represented in the upper and lower brackets of the draw. Armstrong defeated Don Raymond, Yarmouth, 2 and 1, in the first round.

Tomorrow Taylor meets Findlay while Lamy will tee off with Armstrong.

None of the four semi-finalists has ever held the Maritime golf crown. In fact, though weather conditions today were nearly perfect, many of the erstwhile favorites continued to slip. Jack Harris, leader in the qualifying round, was put out by Pete Kelly, who in turn dropped his second round match to Taylor. Harris had Kelly down at one time, they came to the thirteenth all square, and he took four straight holes in the par.

In other first round matches Fred Risteen of Fredericton defeated A. H. Creighton, of the Greenwood Club, Dartmouth, 2 and 1. R. P. Findlay pulled an upset by disposing of Bob Holman, Charlottetown hope, two up. The Halifax chance disappeared in the first round as Bill Dickson, Gorsebrook, lost to Charlie McKinnon, 3 and 1.

Cards were far better today than they were in yesterday's big breeze. The former champions had a good time playing in the lower divisions, with Cain and Don McNaughton both winning a couple of matches. Harry Streeter lost a third division match and wound up in the consolation.

By far the most drama of today's play was packed into the Armstrong McKinnon match. Armstrong had McKinnon two down and two to go, but the local star pulled to square it. They halved the 19th and Armstrong punched the first to within a few feet of the hole to get a par three on the 200 yard 20th, while McKinnon drove the rough and took a four. Taylor, also, was two down appearing at the finish, but took the 19th, 16th and 17th to beat Kelly, Findlay won from Risteen by sinking a long one on the home green, while Lamy was never headed by the elder Findlay after the first hole.

NEW YORKER LOSES TITLE IN SEVENTH

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Aug. 9.—(A.P.)—A cool, barrel-chested young French-Canadian, a native of St. Eugene, Que., Laruping Lou Brouillard caught up with Ben Jeby, stolid New York Hebrew, in the seventh round of a 15-round battle tonight, and stripped him of his claims to the middleweight championship with one rocketing sweep of his left hand.

Brouillard, one of those southpaws whose battle style has confounded orthodox right hand warriors since fistie history began, made a cold, calculating fight of it in adding Jeby's recognition here as the 160-pound king to the honors he already has known as a former welterweight champion of the world.

For six rounds he chopped away at the steady going, game young New Yorker who was hailed as middleweight champion here after he stopped Frankie Battaglia, Canadian middleweight champion of Winnipeg, in 12 rounds last winter. Chunky, durable, Brouillard stabbed out openings with his extended right hand, just the opposite to the usual style of attack, and followed this nipping fist with left smashes to the head and body.

Near the end of the sixth round, Brouillard shook himself of his easy going ways and loosed a volley of left smashes to the body that left Jeby gasping, the air driven from his lungs, as the bell found him, ready to go down under another solid blow, propped in his own corner.

Brouillard lost little time in the seventh. He drew Jeby's guard up with his pawing right and again smashed the left into the champion's sagging body muscles. Try as he would, Jeby could not get his hands up. A sweeping left, brought up from the floor as Brouillard charged in, caught him full on the chin and he crashed to the floor, face down.

Bravely Jeby pulled himself to his knees at the count of eight but they would not hold him. As Referee Pete Hartley looked up to warn Brouillard that he must stay away until the count was completed, Jeby's eyes closed again and he slumped over on his face, completely knocked out. The seventh round lasted two minutes, 21 seconds.

Fast Racing And Close Finishes At Montague Races

Crowd Of Nearly 3,000 Witness Best Racing Ever Seen On Montague Track. Darkey Grattan Lowers Record To 2.07 3/4

Montague race went over big. The attendance was above expectation being almost 3,000. The day was perfect and fast time was the feature of every class. The track record of 2:10 was broken in the exhibition mile given by Darkey Grattan, owned by Hedley T. Fulton, Upper Stewiacke, N. S., and driven by Johnny Conroy, when he paced in 2:07 3/4 in an effort to beat 2:10. Prior to that the track record had been equalled in the second heat of the 2:16 Trot and Pace when in a thrilling finish, coming from third horse entering the home stretch, I'm Alone 2:14 driven by Oliver Rudderham of North Sydney, finished a nose ahead of Beeton Grattan, who was on his bad behaviour sixth. The most sensational heat raced on Montague track in our memory.

In describing the racing of yesterday afternoon one must deal in superlatives because no one that we conversed with but was of the opinion that it was the best racing ever seen there. In addition it was by far the best racing of the season on our local tracks and sent the great big audience home in a delighted mood. Our space is too short and the hour too late to give a very detailed account, but we will endeavor to summarize the various races as they struck us.

2:16 Trot and Pace
This had nine starters, all of them capable of beating 2:14 and it was without a doubt a wonderful race, all the horses bunched throughout with the exception of Heatherbell and Star D, who were not performing in anything like their regular form.

First Heat. They got away on the sixth score with Lillian 2:08 3/4, driven by Peter Conroy, out in front and leading until the turn to the home stretch, when Beeton Grattan took command closely followed by Frank J. Ortolan and King Spruce. These four horses raced down the stretch almost on even terms, but Beeton Grattan got the decision a short half length from Lillian, time 2:12 1/4. Frank J. Ortolan trotted a wonderful heat among the pacers, getting away a couple of lengths back and finishing like a cyclone. He must have trotted from wire to wire in close to 2:10. Star G. was well up with the leaders until the stretch when he faded a bit, while Heatherbell made a lot of breaks. The Willys and Star D. were also off form through breaks.

Second Heat. Beeton Grattan at the pole went away fast with King Spruce on even terms. They raced like a team until the three-quarters, then King Spruce passed Beeton Grattan and seemed to be a sure winner, when just in the last few strides I'm Alone came through on the outside flying and copped the heat by inches. Beeton Grattan also passed King Spruce in the last few steps, but the three horses were very close. Lillian was a good fourth, The Willys, who paced a good heat, landing fifth. Frank Ortolan sixth, Star G. seventh, Heatherbell and Star D. eighth and ninth. When the time was announced it was found that the track record of 2:10 made last year by Hush, had been equalled.

Third Heat. This was another great heat. I'm Alone led to the half when he was passed by King Spruce, who kept the lead to the finish although briskly challenged by I'm Alone first, then Beeton Grattan who came up in the last few strides and nosed out I'm Alone. Frank J. Ortolan a good fourth, Lillian fifth, Star G. sixth, Heatherbell who made a lot of breaks seventh and The Willys eighth, Star D. being drawn. Time 2:10 1/4.
