Germans were withdrawing part of their troops operating in the North. There is nothing to confirm this excepting the fact that Lille-Tourcoing and other exposed points are reported free of the enemy. The admission of the war office that the French troops are retiring south and south-

west is not taken as being inconsistent with the above theory, because naturally it would be strategy for the allies to let the Germans draw their lines out if so disposed in order to take advantage of the resulting weakness at the right moment.
