TWO DIVINES ON PROHIBITION.

Bishop Richardson of the Anglican Church in New Brunswick in a published letter over his official signature "John Frederickton," among other things says: "I should, however, welcome the enactment of a high license law for the larger centres of population in this Province." To this Rev. James Crisp, President of the Methodist Conference of the Methodist Church principles affirmed by the General Conference of the Methodist Church of Canada, in part as follows:

"That the liquor traffic is a business antagonistic to every interest of church and state.

"That the traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is immoral, and it is the duty of the civil government to prohibit it.

"That we condemn the license features of all statutes by which money is accepted for the legal protection of an immoral traffic.

"That the government (dominion, provincial or municipal) that accepts money for liquor license becomes a partner in the business justly declared to be an enemy of God and man. We protest against the unholy alliance."

President Crisp, in accordance with the principles of the Methodist communion in Canada thinks it would look like a backward step to propose anything short of prohibition in New Brunswick, "especially in view of the fact that reliable, conscientious and influential men on Prince Edward Island gave very excellent reports of the working of the Prohibitory Act there."

Several things are noticeable in this contrast of opinions by the provincial officials of two prominent Christian churches. Bishop Richardson by no means represents the views of all Churchmen on this question as many of them are earnest and influential prohibitionists. President Crisp has simply affirmed the established principles of his church in Canada. Further we note the proud position of our own Province, which is being constantly referred to in the other provinces, east and west. Prince Edward Island is at once the leader in prohibition and a noble object lesson for all the rest of the Dominion.

WE WANT THE TUNNEL.

A winter of almost unprecedented mildness enables the winter steamers to ply regularly between Pictou and Georgetown. There is danger that these temporary conditions may influence the judgement and lull to sleep the conscience of our rulers at Ottawa. They hear few complaints and may flatter themselves that all is well. Passengers and mails are coming and going-what more do we want?

We want the assurance that these conditions will continue through the present winter and the winners to come, and we know that this cannot

be. We want a direct instead of a circuitous route, certainty in the place of present uncertainty, and above all a through rate for our products and merchandise instead of present exorbitant short-haul rates. These we can only get by means of the Tunnel and all rail connection.

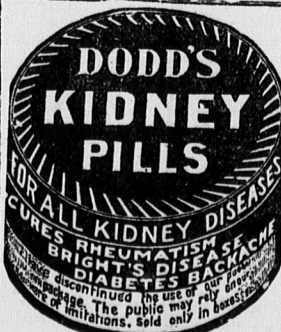

press forward the construction of the Tunnel and so avoid emergencies and loss such as occurred in 1903 and 1905 and which are sure to recur. When such troubles return, as they inevitably will, till the Tunnel is built, the Government must be prepared to face not only the stern resentment of our people, but also a heavy bill of damages that cannot be evaded. The Government has had repeated warnings and should heed them.

In several of the Provinces at election times, notably in New Brunswick at present, there have been exciting controversies as to the amount of the provincial debt. No such controversy exists in the Dominion, because there is an independent authority in the Auditor General, who holds office on terms which make him free from party control. Every Province ought to be in the same position.

A shortage of \$100,000 or more is reported in the sinking fund in St. John city—not that the money has been stolen or embezzled, but appropriated for other civic purposes. How this could have passed undisturbed for years is a strange thing in itself. Too much civic auditing seems to be of the kind that conceals rather than reveals the true state of finances.
