GERMAN SECURITY AIMS ARE REVEALED

SIMON BARES VIEWS TO COMMONS

Claims Disappointment in Outcome of Talks in Berlin With Hitler.

(By Harold F. Braman)
LONDON, April 9.—Sir John Simon, Foreign Secretary, gave the House of Commons the first official summary of Germany's security views today as the British government completed the outline of its peace proposals.

Hitler, Sir John told the Commons, wants:
1. Land and air arms equality.
2. A navy 35 per cent as large as Great Britain's, or about 400,000 tons.
3. A non-aggression pact among powers interested in European questions with provision for consultations in case of aggression, but no eastern Locarno nor mutual assistance pact with France included.

4. No non-aggression pact including Lithuania until the status of Memel territory, former German possession now held by the Baltic country, is satisfactorily regulated.
5. A pact providing for non-interference in Austria only if the powers are able to agree on satisfactory terms to Germany, which gives the difficulty of defining just what constitutes interference.

Britain's Proposal
Great Britain's proposals for an inclusive security arrangement, which Sir John and Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald may present at Geneva Thursday, will include Britain's full participation in an active member, diplomatic circles understood, if France and Italy accept the plan.

Wednesday's regular cabinet session will give the proposals final consideration with Stanley Baldwin, who did not have time to hear the entire program today, present.

The British delegates will not be able to carry out previously announced plans to confer with the French in Paris since the French conference already will be enroute to stress when they reach Paris.

In summarizing the views of the Berlin, Moscow, Warsaw and Prague governments as presented to him and Lord Privy Seal Anthony Eden during their recent confidential visits, Sir John depicted most of his attention to Berlin.

Recommend Interest Rates Be Limited

OTTAWA, April 9.—The Banking and Commerce Committee today voted to recommend to the House of Commons that all interest rates on existing mortgages on farm lands be limited to six per cent. Rates now prevail in Western Canada as high as eight per cent and in other parts of Canada as high as seven per cent.

REICH PAYS TRIBUTE TO LUDENDORFF

Great War Fighter Honored by German Notables on 70th Birthday.

The Third Reich, of which he is an outsider by his own choice, today paid signal honors to the doughty Great War fighter, General Erich Ludendorff, on the occasion of his 70th birthday anniversary.

On every side an effort was made to forget past quarrels. The former Kaiser sent a hand-written message of congratulation. The former Crown Prince, who for many years has been in contact with the former Quartermaster General, personally came to Tutzing to felicitate the warrior.

Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler so far swallowed his pride as to visit Ludendorff before his birthday. He probably would have come today except for Ludendorff's own action in refusing the title of field marshal general and emphasizing his anti-Christian position at a time when Dr. Fuehrer is trying his utmost to assure the church that his government is rooted in Christianity.

General Werner von Blomberg, defence minister, and General Werner von Fritsch, chief of staff, came personally to congratulate Ludendorff.

The uncompromising Prussian, however, insisted upon pursuing his own course and his own ideas. Ostensibly replying to von Blomberg's warm words of tribute, the General reassured his anti-Christian beliefs.
