A.D.C. Hears Interesting Address

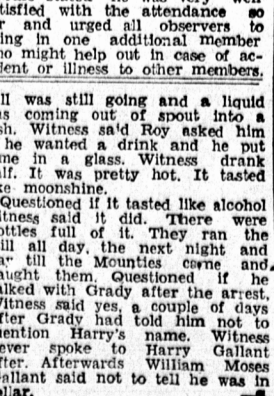
