INTERESTING LECTURE BY MISS SPAULL

League Of Nations Subject Of Timely Address Last Night.

"If we are honest we will have to admit that we have nothing to put in place of the League of Nations," she said in the terrible crisis we now face.

The hall was filled to capacity by an audience which listened with close attention to the intensely interesting and enlightening address.

The speaker in her address last night dealt first with the science of events leading up to the present European crisis.

The first period was when Europe seemed to be emerging from the aftermath and hatred of the Great War. Treaties had been signed, Germany was looking forward to a general disarmament by world power.

Confidences followed and although at times the difficulties in the way of arms reduction seemed to be insurmountable, finally, army, navy and air experts agreed on a skeleton plan of disarmament and it remained but for the politicians to settle the details.

Then in 1931 something unexpected happened. In Manchuria came the testing place for the League, a place where it was least prepared.

The Paris peace terms were proposed but were withdrawn as the result of public opinion. After fifteen years of education by the League Union the government in England was sure of public opinion when pursuing a strong League policy.

It is very necessary, Miss Spauld went on to point out, that the nations of the world today should feel that the British Empire has behind it the backing of the great masses of the British people.

The speaker also told of visiting Russia where the people were greatly interested in League work. Many lectures are given there, even the regiments in the Red army had been hearing lectures on the League and the Kellogg pact.

"This is the time of all times when we must rally to the support of the League of Nations. It is the only protection we have at the present time against war," Miss Spauld said in conclusion.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speaker, moved by Mr. R. H. Rogers and seconded by Mr. H. Shaw.

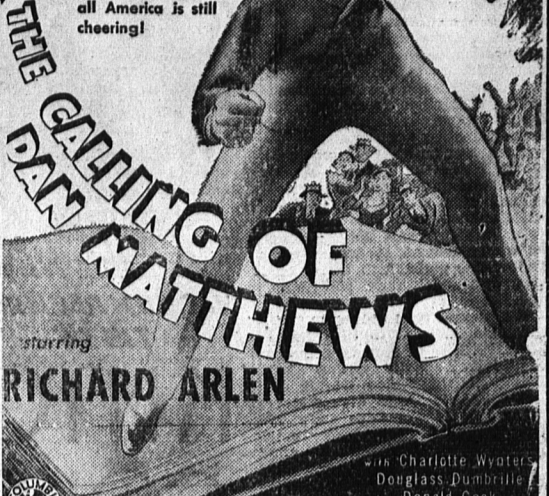
Miss Spauld in reply to a question by Mrs. Rogers told of the work of the League Union in England. Its purpose is to organize public opinion.

Mr. Shaw pointed out that this was the only province in the Dominion that had not a branch of the Canadian League of Nations Society and he suggested that this might be an opportune time to form one.

His Honour Lieutenant Governor DeBolis announced at the close of the meeting that he was pleased to take the matter up at a later date.

GUILTY, IS VERDICT IN KEEFE CASE

Richard Keefe, appearing before Justice Duffy on a charge of retaining in his possession stolen goods, was found guilty when the case concluded yesterday.

Witnesses examined yesterday were: Clarence McGuigan, merchant at Hunter River, Constable Leard of the R.C.M.P., Detective Corporal Corbett of the R.C.M.P., who was re-called, Cecil Campbell, also re-called, Henry Pollard, and the accused Richard Keefe.

A short summary of the evidence taken yesterday follows: The first witness, Clarence McGuigan, merchant at Hunter River, testified that he had bought oats from the accused on two occasions this year that he remembered.

Constable Leard of the R.C.M.P. testified that in 1932 he had given evidence in a case where the accused, Richard Keefe, was charged with having stolen goods in his possession. He had been convicted and sent to jail for six months.

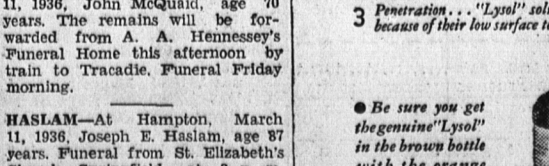

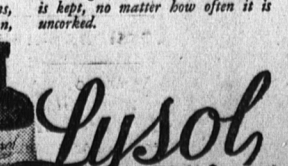


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
