C. G. S. Brant Locates Wrecked Dredge

On Tuesday morning the C. G. S. "Brant" left for the scene of the recent wreck in an endeavour to locate the dredge. "Ferguson" Owing to the heavy seas she was unable to do any work and returned to this port.

Another attempt was made Wednesday morning and the submerged dredge was located about nine or ten miles west of St. Peter's Island light in twelve fathoms of water.

One "spud" showed above the surface of the water about ten feet.

Capt. Kelly of the Brant placed a Green Spar Buoy to the south west of the sunken dredge.

The crew dragged the vicinity for some time but no trace of the bodies was found. The boat returned to port in the afternoon.

MONTREAL, Que., June 24.—The demand for foreign buyers for oats and barley on the Montreal market for nearby shipment was good today but owing to the scarcity of ocean freight room, the trade volume was curtailed.

There was no change in the condition of the market for car lots of grain, prices being steady with a moderate demand from local and country buyers. Sales No. 2 Canadian western were made at 62-12 cent, No. 1 feed at 55-12 cents per bushel.

The export and local trade in spring wheat flour was limited but prices were unchanged. The market for the winter wheat trade was extremely dull, demand from the British West Indies and sales of some fair sized lots were made.

The movement for local account was small but the market was steady. A weaker feeling developed in the market for mill feed and prices were reduced \$2.00 per ton. Manitoba bran was quoted at \$27.25, shorts \$25.25 and middlings at \$36.25 per ton. The demand for standard grades of rolled oats was limited but prices were firm.

The potato market displayed further weakness and prices were reduced another ten cents per bag. \$17.00 per bag. Prices for all grades of eggs were well maintained, under a quiet demand which was due to the Quebec holiday.

Junior Baseball North Side

A Voice—Let the future look after itself. If you are dead next year, the future is not much good to you. Mr. Cox—We must think, however, of our children. Mr. Gallant—If this meeting passed a resolution the government will ask me if it represents the lobster industry of Prince Edward Island. Voices—Yes and no. Mr. Cox said he had interviewed the fishermen of two factories and they were all in favour of the change. He believed that the North Side was pretty well represented at the meeting. Mr. Jerome Peters, of Rustico, said that he represented the Rustico Cannery Company, and every fisherman in Rustico was opposed to the fall season. They want to protect the lobster industry. Mr. Peter's statement aroused a storm of protests, and for a time a sharp argument was carried on between him and the other fishermen. Mr. Gallant's question of having a petition circulated was stated that when the fall season was granted in 1917, no petition was then necessary. The present ten days extension to July 5th was also discussed, and the opinion was expressed that this extension was of little or no value, a number of the factories intending discontinuing in a few days. The chairman then read two telegrams from the Fishermen's Union of Tignish, recommending a fall season from the 15th of August to the 15th of September. Mr. Chester Pratt, of St. Peter's, said the suggestion had been made to ask for a fall season this year, and then close the factories for two years, and use the factories for canning other fish. He would like to know what the meeting thought of it. Judging from the cries of "No good, no good," the meeting did not favour the suggestion. Mr. Pratt pointed out that in Newfoundland they had tried the fall season, and as a result they had two closed seasons. Mr. James B. MacDonald, M. P. P., said that everything being equal, he would recommend a fall season, but as the fishermen this year, owing to the unusual conditions, and the fishermen came together and made an appeal they should be heard. If they wanted the fall season they would do what he could to help them. Mr. Joshua Henderson, of Lot 11, expressed himself in favour of a fall season, as did also John Palmer, of Lot 11, and John Stewart of New London. Mr. Stewart gave his experience of the fall season of 1917. The results, he said, were then quite satisfactory. In his factory the following year he made a better catch than even in the previous year. Mr. Milton Doyle, of French Village, said that all were in favour of the late season. He believed that the fishermen need the money to pay their bills. They are hard up. Mr. J. J. Blaquere, of North Rustico, maintained that a fall season would mean destroying the industry. In reply to the chairman he stated that they had good fishing at Rustico this year. You had good fishing yourselves, and that is the reason you do not wish a late season for others? asked the chairman. Another speaker said that Rustico did not want a fall season because they have on inside fishing ground where fish can be taken. Mr. Russell Clark said as this spring's fishing had been very poor he thought it would be advisable to give at least a trial season, and it could be adopted permanently in place of the spring fishing if found advisable. In August the fishermen would be better prepared than in the spring. He believed a catch of 8,000 in August would be as good as 12,000 in the spring season. He moved a resolution asking for a fall season. This motion was seconded by Mr. Pratt. All voted in favour of the resolution except the three representatives from Rustico. It was decided that petitions would be circulated if found necessary. The above resolution was then wired to Mr. W. A. Found, Director of Fisheries, Ottawa, and the four Federal representatives, after it had been put in shape by a committee consisting of the following: Russell Clark, Mr. Stewart; E.H.S. Lacey; Tracadie; J. P. MacIntyre, Savage Harbour; J. B. MacDonald, M. P. P., Savage Harbour; Lloyd Cox, Morell; Warren Gibbs, Grand Tracadie; A. D. Macdonald, Grand Tracadie; J. MacIntyre, Morell; Milton Doyle, Mt. Stewart; Chester Pratt, St. Peter's; Josiah Baker, Morell; James A. Weeks, New London; J. D. Palmer, Conway; Waldo Matthews, Alberton; Gus O'Hanley, Cable Head; Joshua Henderson, Lot 11, and Joseph Robertson.
