At a recent meeting of the Junior Hockey Clubs of St. Dunstan's College a league, henceforth to be known as the St. Dunstan's College A. H. L. was formed. The officers elected were:

David Glover, 78, one of the oldest and most widely known contractors and builders of this city, died of Bright's disease late yesterday afternoon at his home, 156 Pitman street. He had been active in his business affairs up to six weeks ago, when his health began to fail, and while he was confined to the house a greater part of that time, he was able to take a short walk Monday afternoon. He was the senior member of the firm of David Glover & Co., on Benefit street. He had followed the contracting business for 47 years, and had built some of the largest buildings in the city. He was the oldest member and deacon of the First Presbyterian Church on Clifford street, having joined that church 36 years ago. He had served as senior deacon for the last 30 years. The funeral will be held in his late home, 156 Pitman street, Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, and the burial will take place in Pocomet Cemetery. Mr. Glover was born in Prince Edward Island in 1832, and was the son of Thomas and Sarah (Hughes) Glover. His father was a native of Scotland, and his mother was of Massachusetts parentage. He attended public schools of his home town and completed his apprenticeship as a carpenter in 1849. He came to this city in 1863 and started in business. He was one of the early members of the Mechanics Exchange, composed of the contractors and builders, now known as the Master Builders' Association. In 1865 he returned to Charlottetown, P. E. I., where he married Miss Catherine Creighton of that place, returning to this city with his bride shortly after. Of this union six children were born, of which five with a widow, survive him. Of the five children, Frederick K. is living in California, while the others, Charlotte A., Robert C., George L., and Catherine M., all live in this city. Among the large buildings erected by Mr. Glover are Infantry Hall, the Ashbury Memorial Church, the William Fletcher building, where the present Journal building stands, and the A. P. Hoyt grammar school in East Providence, which was built in 1891. This was the last large building that Mr. Glover erected.—Boston paper. (The late Mr. Glover is a brother of Mrs. Norman N. MacLeod, St. Avards, Mrs. Montague Pigott and Robert Glover, Mt. Stewart, all so four brothers in the United States.)

I.: A daring forgery was committed in the city Wednesday, as a result of which the firm of McCoubrey & Bullman is out the sum of \$25.50, while the man who passed the bogus check on them is still at liberty. Shortly after noon Wednesday a young man appeared at the store of McCoubrey & Bullman and after purchasing some goods asked if they would cash a check—for him. Mr. Bullman examined the check and thinking it was all right a clerk passed out the money for it. The check was signed by J. A. McCallum & Co., had the name of J. A. McCallum & Co. on it, and was payable to and indorsed by a man who signed himself "Dugald Murray." The check was drawn on the Bank of Montreal. Shortly afterwards Mr. Bullman went to the bank to have the check cashed, and was surprised to learn that the firm of J. A. McCallum & Co. had no account at that institution, and that the check was worthless. The firm then informed him that they had not issued any such check, and Mr. Bullman was forced to admit that he had been swindled out of \$25.50. The check had no account at the bank which was supposed to have issued the check have no account at the Bank of Montreal, carrying one with the Royal instead. The police are now working on the case, but up to the present have not captured the swindler.

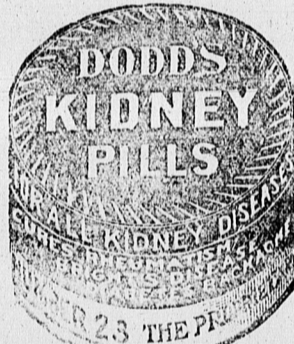

Her husband predeceased her by twenty-two years and her last request was that she be laid beside her in the burial plot at Forest Hills, Prince Edward Island. Funeral services were conducted at the house by Rev. Alexander D. MacKinnon, pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Boston, of which the deceased was a devoted member for several years. Before the remains were laid to rest divine worship was again conducted in the Presbyterian Church of Dundas, P. E. I. A largely attended memorial service was held in St. Andrew's, Boston, on the 22nd instant. The deceased was a daughter of the late Thomas Richardson, shipbuilder, of Vernon River, P. E. I. On her mother's side she was a MacClure. Three of her sons are still on the old homestead at Forest Hill, P. E. I., and three sons and one daughter live in Massachusetts. She lived during the later years of her life with her youngest son, Andrew. Whilst they all mourn

for her removal from their midst they rejoice in the blessed memory of a noble mother, a true Christian and a perfect lady always.—Com.
