The Maritime Board of Trade meets at Yarmouth Aug. 18th. Among the subjects to be discussed will be Communication between P. E. I. and the Mainland.

On Wednesday morning the storeroom of the Dominion Hotel, Dundas, was burglarized and three barrels of beer taken. The thief has not been captured.

The second Sunday afternoon Y.M.C.A. meeting will be held at Victoria Park (near drinking fountain) at 4 p. m. next Sunday. Rev. Mr. Sedgewick will deliver an address, and Zion Church choir will conduct the singing. All welcome, no collection.

Reports from the west are to the effect that the growth is phenomenal, and if the present favorable weather continues the harvest will be one of the earliest in the history of the country. W. A. Matheson, chief grain buyer for the Lake of the Woods Milling company, who has returned from a trip west and south, states that in his twenty-five years' experience he has never seen the present crop prospects of the Canadian west excel. The growing crop, according to Mr. Matheson, is now about perfect, and if the remainder of the season should be favorable the country should cut the largest crop in its history. "On the whole I think the crop is about a week later than usual. I examined the wheat thoroughly and could find no trace of rust. I do not like to prophesy what the yield will be, but with such weather as the country has had the last week continued, Manitoba and the territories should cut the largest crop in their history."
