MEMEL EDGES CLOSER TO NAZI ORBIT

KAUNAS, Lithuania, Dec. 14 (AP)—Lithuania's unruly stepchild, Memel, edged closer to the skirts of another Germany today while Antanas Smetona began his fourth term as President of Lithuania with the troubled words: "we small countries must be careful."

Agitation in small but truculent Memel to go "back to the Reich" and troubled from his rightist foes in Lithuania proper, beset the all-Nationalist Government of the peasant-born Smetona, who has been Lithuania's chief of state with only a brief interruption since the nation became independent after the war.

(Lithuania has 55,970 square miles of which the Memel territory, formerly a part of Germany, comprises 1,099 square miles.)

Without waiting to count the votes on Sunday's Memel diet election, which they were confident would give them all but two or three seats, the Memel Germans told the Lithuanian state police to get out.

Both Smetona and Memel's veterinarian "Fuehrer," Ernest Neumann, awaited word from Reichsfuehrer Hitler as to whether he wants Memel attached to Germany or merely German in fact but not in name.

Word of Hitler's position was expected to arrive in Kaunas by the German Minister in Berlin, Wilhelm Zechlin, who is in Berlin. Neumann already has said "the fate of Memel will not be decided here." Political observers meant it would be decided in Berlin.

Just how far Berlin and the Memel Nazis will go in their demands will become clear to Europe when the new Memel diet, or Parliament, meets in January.

In Kaunas the authorities closed the local university in the face of student strikes which followed arrests of 100 students and at least one riot during political meetings.

The Government proclaimed on Saturday a six-months decree "for the protection of state," and the arrests followed.

The decree ousting the Lithuanian state security police from Memel was issued by the Memel director, a Lithuanian body which exercises executive functions in that territory. Hereafter the director will recognize only the Memel autonomy police.

Kaunas sources said Lithuania probably would bow to the decree and withdraw the Lithuanian police from Memel, but the Lithuanian press said the Lithuanian police might mean the Lithuanian police would be able to concentrate its activities in Memel.

TIME TO MEND ATTITUDE

BERLIN, Dec. 12 (AP)—The German foreign office mouthpiece said today it is time for the Lithuanian Government to mend its attitude toward Memel in the light of "united confession of Memellanders to their German nationality," as shown by yesterday's heavy Nazi vote in Memel diet elections.

The organ, the Deutsche Diplomatische Politische Korrespondenz, said the overwhelming participation in the election should lead Lithuania to the road to take it. It continued:

"How the Lithuanian Government will act toward the new expression of the will of Memellanders is essential for determination of future developments.

"It must be clear at once that mistakes committed in the past by the Lithuanian Government will continue without consequences."

The organ then declared that the Lithuanian Government by denying Memel "certain guarantees" and "through its actions" had hastened developments in the present direction.

The paper hastened to state that there is no "traditional enmity" of Germans toward Lithuanians. It concluded:

"To that extent yesterday's manifestation of Memellanders can now show the need for fruitful and improved development of relations between the two peoples (Lithuanians and Memellanders) and prepare an end for all contested points."

Order New Trial In Ship's Case

OTTAWA, Dec. 12 (CP)—The Supreme Court of Canada today ordered a new trial of the case of Alfred Watson against the Canadian National Steamship Company. Watson was a carpenter employed on the S. S. Cornwall which was proceeding from the West Indies to Charlottetown.

While he was busy putting locking bars on the hatches a wave swept over the deck and threw him against the bulkhead. The jury in a trial at Montreal found the accident was due to the negligence of the company in that if the ship's chief officer had ordered life lines erected earlier it would not have happened. Watson was awarded \$4,000 for his injuries.

The court of King's Bench upheld the verdict and the company appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada.

Japanese Advance On Chinese Territory

SHANGHAI, Dec. 13 (AP)—Chinese military leaders asserted today that Japanese armies occupy only about one-seventh of the area of 11 provinces included in the principal zone of the Japanese invasion.

The Chinese said the invaders occupy only 118 Haier or counties in the 11 provinces, which have a total area of 550,000 square miles and 378,000,000 population.

Of the 550,000 square miles is only about one-fourth of China's total area, but it includes nearly all of China that figures in world trade. In this section the Japanese hold practically all cities, railways and industrial centres.

(The Chinese claim apparently is based on the relatively small area actually garrisoned by Japanese troops. Its mention of 11 provinces omits two of the 13 provinces into

Stresses Importance Of Empire Markets

WINNIPEG, Dec. 13 (CP)—Importance of the maintenance of Empire markets, especially the United Kingdom—Canada's biggest customer for wheat and flour—stressed before the Prairie Markets Conference here today by C. H. G. Short of Montreal, general manager of the Lake of the Woods Milling Company.

"The problems, present and future of the wheat producer and the miller are not merely related, they are interlicably interwoven," he declared.

It is imperatively essential to the success of the Canadian flour Milling industry as equally to the wheat producer, that Canada should retain as export flour markets Great Britain, the British West Indies and should be entitled to regard Newfoundland as a natural market he added.

"Old Man" Phase Hardly Suitable

LONDON, Dec. 13—Prime Minister Chamberlain, in his address to the Foreign Press Association tonight complained about being referred to as "that old man." He said he did not feel old.

"In one respect, perhaps," he added, "the passage of years has left its mark on me and that is in the recognition of the futility of ambition if that ambition leads to the desire for domination."
