THE IRISH LAND QUESTION.

Of late a strong effort is being made to settle the Irish land question which has been the fertile cause of discontent for generations past. Representatives of the land owners and of the occupiers have got together for the purpose of seeking a solution satisfactory to both sides and the meeting included prominent men of both political parties. There is therefore some reason to hope that the agreement reached may be crystallized into law in the not distant future.

The most important point in the agreement arrived at is the following:—"That the only satisfactory settlement of the land question is to be effected by the substitution of an occupying proprietary in lieu of the existing system of dual ownership." For the purpose of carrying out this plan, the conference, in substance proposed that the price at which the land should be transferred from the owner to the occupiers should, if possible, be agreed upon between the parties; that this price should be based on actual income, and should be paid either by a guarantee of that income or by a capital sum that would yield it at 3 per cent. or 3 1/2 per cent.; that this price, when agreed on, should be paid or guaranteed by the National Government, and should be collected again from the purchasing occupiers, in whole or in part.

It is significant that among the parties to the agreement are such prominent persons as Lords Dunraven and Mayo on the one side and John Redmond and William O'Brien on the other. The plan involves a considerable departure from old-fashioned methods, but bears some resemblance to that adopted for the solution of the land question in Prince Edward Island. With the land question satisfactorily settled in Ireland it will cost much less to police the country, and if the Government in carrying out such a plan should be actually buying a peace—and it looks like that—it might and probably would prove to be a paying arrangement in the end. In any case the prospects for a settlement of the vexed land question look something brighter than they have for a good while past.

CANADIANS IN THE UNITED STATES.

According to the United States census of the year 1900 there were then in that country 1,183,225 persons whose birth place was Canada. A larger number—1,319,412—were of Canadian parentage, reckoning only those both of whose parents belonged to the Dominion. These added make a grand total of 2,502,637. There are doubtless still a considerable number more who are children of a Canadian and American parent. But if we reckon only Canadians born and their immediate descendants—the children of Canadian parents on both sides, we have the figures above quoted, 2,502,637, which is not far short of one half as many as the population of Canada. If grandchildren were reckoned, and there must be many of these, the figures would be still larger.

It may be of interest to compare the number of Canadians with those of other nationalities in the Republic. Of those we have not advanced the price of our tobacco, Amber smoking tobacco, Bobs, Play chewing tobaccos are the same size and price to the consumer as formerly. It appears from the above table that with the exception of Germany and Ireland Canada has been the largest contributor to the foreign born population of the United States. But the Canadian contribution has been nearly equal to one-half of the number of her home population. Ireland has contributed a million more of her sons and daughters than are now living in the Emerald Isle. Norway has also almost as large a proportion of her native born children now residents in the United States as Canada has.

The numbers of Canadians in the States would be more alarming than they are were the exodus still as large as it was in former years. It is not now so large as formerly, although still a considerable stream. But a return tide has set in, mainly directed to the North West, and we may reasonably hope that Canada will now gain more by migration than she will lose. In that case we may count upon the full benefit of the natural increase of our population and something more. The changed condition should make a splendid showing for the Dominion in the census of 1911.

The Halifax Chronicle the other day printed a list of the leading public libraries of Nova Scotia. Fourteen are enumerated ranging from 1200 to 24,000 volumes each, the latter being the Citizens' Free Library of Halifax. Four others of the number are also located in that city. Wolfville, Windsor, Antigonish, Yarmouth, Truro, Pictou, Baddock, and Sydney also have places in the list. The aggregate of the libraries is something over 120,000 volumes of books, besides many thousands of pamphlets. Some day Charlottetown will make a move along similar lines and perhaps catch up with Summerside.

HEAVY DAMAGES ASKED.

NEW YORK, Feb. 5.—The largest suit on record for the loss of human life will be tried in the Supreme Court at White Plains to-day, when the New York Central Railway will be asked to pay \$250,000 damages for the death of Mr. Alfred S. Perrin, of New Rochelle, who was killed in the Park avenue crash. The action is brought by a trust company as executor for the Perrin estate and guardian of the children.
