REPORTS BIG IRON STRIKE IN NORTH.

HUDSON'S HOPE, B. C., Oct. 18.—Western Canada can have the cheapest supply of iron and steel product on the continent, in the belief of W. A. Rae of the Grande Pacific, who has forwarded reports of an iron strike north of here by three prospectors.

Original discovery was made by Bill Carter, Bill Limes, and Fred Blanchard, all well-known prospectors, well acquainted with the district.

According to Rae, upon arrival at Hope, the prospectors recorded many claims. The showing lies thirty miles northwest of town and covers about sixty miles of territory, and up to the present time nine-foot pits have failed to reach bottom or to show a decline in the value of the ore.

Analysis indicates the ore is sixty per cent, purer iron, self-fluxing and free from impurities.

BLUENOSE OUT FOR TRIAL SPIN

GLOUCESTER, Mass., Oct. 17.—Captain Angus Walters took the Lunenburg schooner Bluenose out of Massachusetts Bay today for a trial spin over the course on which she will meet the Gloucesterman Henry Ford in races, beginning on next Saturday. The Canadian champion sailed alone. It was expected that Captain Walters would put her on the marine railway for overhauling tomorrow or Thursday.
