**FUNERAL SERVICES FOR DR. GOODWILL**

Large Concourse Of Citizens Pay Last Respects To "Beloved Physician."

Charlottetown citizens of all walks of life crowded into St. James Presbyterian Church yesterday to pay final tribute to Lt. Col. Victor L. Goodwill, M.D.

The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. Moorhead Legate, D.D., who paid the following glowing tribute to the memory of the beloved physician:

"In one of his pastoral epistles, you remember, Paul referred to St. Luke, who was a doctor, as the 'beloved physician.' I am sure that to many of us today, that beautiful epithet will be considered most apt to express our feelings as we perform these last sad offices for one who so highly adorned the noble profession to which he consecrated his life, and who is sincerely mourned by this congregation gathered here and by the whole province.

"It is not my place to set before you now any record of his life and work. That is already well known to you without my telling. To me in this hushed hour, the recollections of the man that are strongest are his personal Christian character, his modest and genuine faith, his unbroken regular attendance at the House of God, his high fulfillment of the office of the eldership, to which he was heartily elected by the people, the pleasure and worth of his personal friendship, the many acts of kindness and charity, some of which were never known save to those who received them.

"Please God, all these things that we recall about our departed friend will abide with us, and these treasures of memory will help our steps along life's troubled pathway until we meet again, where broken friendships are reunited and where beyond these voices there is peace."

The familiar hymns "Nearer My God To Thee" and "Rock of Ages" were sung.

The Masonic ritual was performed by Grand Secretary Capt. E. Kemp.

The Masons, members of the Canadian Legion, active militia officers, the Ladies Auxiliary of the Canadian Legion, the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire attended in a body.

The mourners were members of the Session of St. James Church and the Medical Association of Prince Edward Island.

Last night members of the precinct remained on guard in the church, the body leaving this morning for Kingston, Ontario.

**INTERESTING DEBATE**—Members of the Knights of Columbus who have had several interesting debates lately met again Tuesday night and debated on the subject, "Resolved that the fear of punishment has more influence on human conduct than the hope of reward." The debate was opened for the pro side by Prof. W. J. MacDonald who was ably supported by Mr. J. J. Duffy. Mr. E. J. H. Morrissey and Dr. J. Reddin ably presented the con argument.

A general discussion then took place, many of the members taking part and presenting excellent arguments both pro and con. The critic, Rev. M. E. Francis declared a tie. Prior to the debate Rev. Father Francis gave the second of a series of talks on public speaking. A study class is being organized by the council having as its chief object the training of its members in public speaking. Prof. F. J. McMillan was the chairman.

**SNOW CAUSED DELAY**—A three-day snow storm piling up huge drifts, interrupted all railway services on Prince Edward Island yesterday. The mainline train arrived in Charlottetown at 11 o'clock last night, 3 hours and 40 minutes late. Part of the delay was caused by the Ocean Limited being delayed about two hours by the storm.

Muskat also lost an hour owing to heavy ice and the story is bound trains yesterday morning were considerably behind schedule. The train from Tignish arrived at 2.55 p. m., an hour and a half late, and the Summerside train at 12 o'clock, an hour and fifteen minutes late. The Eastern and Mayway Harbour trains were also over an hour late arriving in the City. A wing snow plough sent out to clear the western line had difficulty in a cutting near Kelvin, taking about an hour to widen it. The regular passenger plane took off for Moncton yesterday but was unable to make the return trip. Motor traffic on the city streets was able to proceed only with difficulty, and many of the streets were completely blocked, despite the efforts of snow plows, which the City kept in operation all day.

**Build New Clock World's Biggest**

(By The Canadian Press)

MONTRÉAL, Feb. 27.—Montreal will soon be able to boast of possessing the world's largest clock.

The giant time-piece, whose mechanism will weigh approximately six tons and whose dial area will be nearly seven times that of the famous "Big Ben" in London, is now under construction and will be erected on the roof of a local building. At the top of a 60 foot steel tower, it will be in plain view to citizens within a radius of 10 miles. It will be brightly illuminated at night.

The huge clock will have three dials facing three ways, each with a diameter of 60 feet, which is 42 feet larger than the big clock on the Ottawa Peace Tower.

It is of interest that repairs or cleaning may be done without stopping the clock, and that the hands will be able to support a man without interfering with the correct time. The revolving pendulum 2,400 pounds will also be able to carry the weight of a man without affecting the correct operation of the clock.

It is expected the clock will be in use by the end of next summer.
