## WHITTIER GIRL'S BODY IN THE CHARLES RIVER

BOSTON, March 20.—The body of Florence E. Whittier, the Ipswich girl, who has been missing since Jan. 13, and for whom the police of every city and town in New England have been searching, was found by a schoolboy yesterday morning, floating in the Charles River not far from the Cambridge end of the Harvard bridge.

With the discovery of the girl's body a mystery that has rivaled the disappearance of Dorothy Arnold, the New York girl, has been almost wholly solved.

How long the body had been in the water the medical examiners who performed an autopsy last night, were unable to state definitely. Whether it had been frozen in the river for two months or whether it had been in the water but three or four days, they could not determine.

According to Medical Examiner Swan, who with Medical Examiner Durrell performed the autopsy, death was by drowning. "There were no marks of violence on the body," said Mr. Swan, "and all the organs were in a normal condition."

The discovery of the body resulted from the mistake of Leander Seguin, a 15-year-old student at the Webster Grammar School, Cambridge, who missed school yesterday because he thought he heard the "no session" bells ringing. The boy is the son of Abraham and Mrs. Seguin of 19 Watson Street, Cambridge.

Letters poured in to the Whittier family at Ipswich from all parts of the country, some containing what purported to be clues, and others offering to disclose her whereabouts for specified amounts.

The search, headed by Detective H. Albert Wright, led to Spencer, Somerville, Ware, Worcester, New London and Windsor, Vermont, but all in vain.

The girl, who was 19 years of age, was a daughter of Mary and Whittier, a member of the Ipswich Board of Health and a retired merchant of that town, and at the time of her disappearance was attending the Bryant & Stratton business college in Boston. Her family is connected with that of the poet Whittier.

On the day on which she was last seen she left the business college shortly after 2 o'clock, presumably to go home. She was never seen alive again.

## HOW IT FEELS TO LOSE SOME \$8,000

DETROIT, Mich., March 17.—A. O. Brown, the famous ex-broker of Wall Street, is here, and is now the manager of a theatrical show at \$75 a week.

One night a few years ago he went to bed worth \$4,000,000, and when he got up in the morning he owed \$8,000,000. He was head of A. O. Brown & Co., one of the largest stock brokerage concerns in the country.

"I'm glad it came when it did," he said yesterday morning at the Pointe-aux-Leslieux. "If I had been an older man I might have cut my throat as some of them do, or drank myself to death. I was only 36 when the failure came. On the night of the crash I swore off drinking and haven't touched a drop since."

"I owe \$8,000,000 now. But what's that among friends?"

"I came about through my taking terrific chances and backing big men. I went short one Saturday morning in August 1,500,000 shares of stock. I had often swung a few thousand shares. I made the big plunge. That was on Saturday. My judgement was good, for I could have sold out Monday with a profit over \$1,000,000 or so. But I hung on. Tuesday they closed me up after examining my financial resources. Thursday the stocks went off two points and a half, and if they had left me alone until that time I would have made at least \$3,000,000. As it was I owed \$8,000,000."

"I was backing big men, Morgan at that time was strongly bullish, and the screws were out for me. Whiff!—everything went in a night. The expenses of my business were \$1,000,000 a year. I had to take in that much to break even. I had on my books 9,000 active accounts, and was operating the largest commission brokerage business in the country. My bill with the Western Union every year was over \$300,000."

Mr. Brown still looks young. Losing something like \$12,000,000 over night has not even turned his hair gray. He has lost 70 pounds since it happened, but he says he feels better.

"The exact spot at which I first saw it is about half way between the Harvard bridge and the Brookline bridge, a trifle nearer the Harvard gate Hospital."

"While Harkins stayed on the river bank to watch the body, I ran to the street and after a while met Patrolman Doherty of Station 2, Cambridge, who hurried back with me. He went to the Charlesbank Hospital and telephoned for the police ambulance and they took the body away."

"As soon as I saw the body at close view I knew it was that of an ordinary working girl, for her clothing was of excellent material and well-made. At the time I thought her to be about 17 or 18 years of age, and was much surprised to read that she was thought to be 30 years of age."

The girl's body was brought to Undertaker Litchfield's place of business at 405 Massachusetts Avenue and a description of her wearing apparel and general appearance was given out.

The articles on the body which gave the first clue as to the possible identity of the girl were a white linen handkerchief found in her pocket and bearing the initials "G. M. Whittier," and a chased gold ring that she wore on the little finger of her left hand.
