**JAPANESE COURAGE.**

It is not of the courage of the individual Japanese soldier that we propose to speak. That is now world-famous. It is rather of the courage which enabled the Japanese Government and nation within ten years to engage in war with two empires, the greatest in territorial extent as well as the most populous in the world—China and Russia. In 1894 Japan fearlessly went to war with China, an Empire of 400,000,000 of people, then fully ten times her own numbers, and for all that the world then knew, fully as well equipped for warfare as Japan.

China had at that time a formidable fleet of armored battleships and cruisers, superior in tonnage, guns and men to the fleet which Japan possessed. She could easily put in the field an army outnumbering the Japanese forces by four to one. It was a sublime spectacle when thus a nation of forty millions boldly attacked an Empire of four hundred millions. We all know the result. In a single campaign she sank or captured her enemy's fleet, defeated his armies, captured his greatest stronghold and dictated peace on her own terms.

In the present year we have had the further striking illustration of the national courage and confidence of Japan. She boldly declared war against the mightiest military power of the twentieth century, an empire whose territories cover more than one half of Europe and more than one third of Asia. No country that ever existed on the earth possessed such hosts of armed men as Russia possesses. Her total naval strength was twice as great as that of Japan. In the East alone her fleets were superior in tonnage, gun power and men to the total naval strength of Japan. It was a much bolder venture than the war against China, and again the attack must be made beyond the sea.

But thus far in the present war as in that of ten years ago the sublime courage of Japan has been amply justified by results. In her first onset she crippled the Russian fleet and gained for herself that dominance of the sea, without which she must have been powerless to conduct an offensive campaign. She has since in a long succession of bloody battles defeated

the vast armies of Russia, led by her most redoubtable commanders and driven them to the far north. She has surrounded, besieged and reduced to the last extremity the most formidable Russian stronghold in the East, which now totters to its fall. She has whipped her gigantic enemy in every flight and closed the first campaign in triumph over a foe not only defeated but humiliated.

Such is the Japan of today in resourceful warfare. When a few days or weeks hence she has possessed herself a second time of Port Arthur, once the lawful prize of her victorious arms, but of which she was basely defrauded, where is the power or the combination of powers that will attempt to wrest it from her? And should the attempt be made, what could be the chances of success, when those almost impregnable defences are guarded by such men as Negi is now leading to the assault, such men as the victors of Yalu River, of Nanshan Hill, of Liao Yang and of Shakhe River?

We know by the daily records of the war something of the superb courage of the Japanese soldier—dauntless, resourceful, enduring. The national courage is made up of millions of these units. It fears no foe however colossal. So far in two successive and victorious wars Japan has whipped two vast Empires whose population includes one third of the entire human race. The mind almost fails to comprehend these achievements in all their vastness and fulness of import to the world. Never before in the world's history has national courage risen to loftier heights, and never before was the calm confidence of a nation in itself and against most tremendous odds more amply justified.

**MANY SEEK RELIGION.**

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 6.—The American evangelists, Torrey and Alexander, opened a three months' revival here today in a building that had specially been erected for the purpose with a seating capacity of 12,000 and which is called "Tournament Hall." Twenty thousand people came to the opening meeting. The choir numbers 3,500, and there are 600 trained workers. The whole city is stirred, and Mr. Torrey believes that Great Britain is on the eve of a great religious awakening.

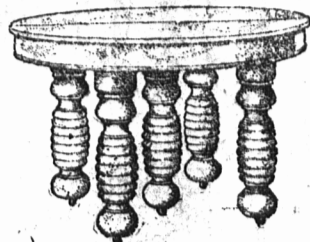

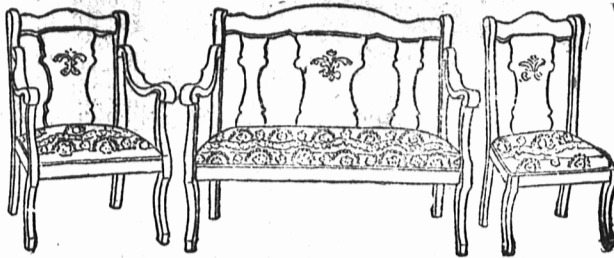
