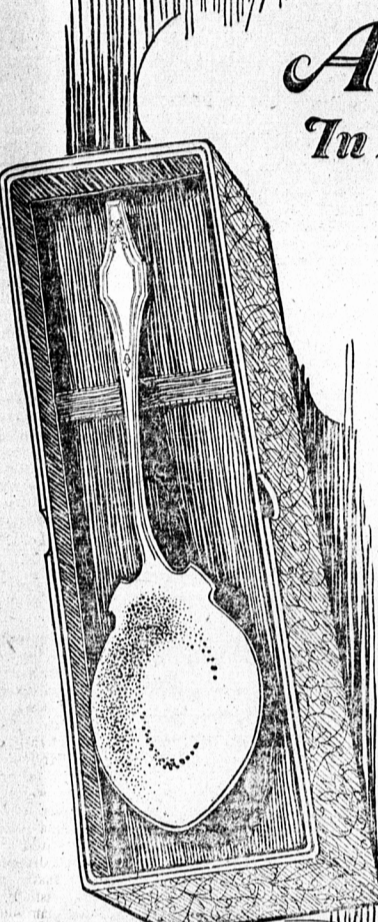

Religious Education enjoyed a large measure of the time and the thought of the members of the district present. In the evening addresses on religious education were delivered by Rev. J. H. Philip; D. of the Sackville Methodist Church, and by the Methodist Field Secretary. The week end of Nov. 12th and 13th, was spent on the Alberton Circuit in Prince Edward Island. Here Mr. Strothard accepted the fine opportunity of speaking to four large congregations, emphasizing the important phases of religious education associated with the subjects of the Home, Graded Instruction and Graded Training, and the Four Square Life. At Hunter River P. E. I. another large congregation to hear more of all round development among our young people. In many parts of P. E. I., notably in rural places, the churches are carrying on most successful work on the Canadian Standard Training programme. Some members of these Rural Taxis Squares, Trail Rangers and Girls in Training drive as far as eight miles each week in order to attend their mid-week sessions. At Bedeque the weather was so stormy on Nov. 15 that even those enthusiastic boys and girls of Standard Training could not gather for a special meeting with Mr. Strothard. Mr. Strothard has been spending the last three week ends in association with Mr. Machum and Mr. Milligan at Boy's Conferences in Halifax, Nov. 17-19, Charlottetown Nov. 24-26, and Moncton Dec. 1-3. The Conferences this year have been largely attended and in several instances have been reported as "good as ever". On the respective Sundays addresses have been given by the Methodist Field Secretary in Brunswick Street Methodist Church, United Memorial Church, Halifax, in the Methodist Church, Charlottetown and in Wesley Memorial Church and Central Methodist Churches Moncton. Mr. Strothard spent Nov. 24th with the Chatham District Meeting convened at Millerton and Nov. 10th with the Summerside District Meeting convened at Summerside. Where in both cases religious education received most generous and thoughtful consideration. Subjects such as worship in the Sunday School, Teacher Training, Graded Instruction and the asking of the public Services of the church interesting to boys and girls were discussed and were committed to the
