## A BILL TO AMEND AUTOMOBILE ACT

The following are the principal sections of the bill to amend the present law prohibiting automobiles to run in this Province and to safeguard the public. Visitors desiring to run an auto will be required to register number and pay fee. The following preamble will show how the law is to be amended and not repealed:

The following is an act to amend an act to prohibit the use of motor vehicles upon the public highways of this Province:

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly of the Province of Prince Edward Island, as follows:

The preamble of the Act 8 Edward VII. Cap 13, is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor: Whereas it has become necessary in the public interest, and for the safety of the travelling public, to place restrictions on the use and operation of motor vehicles on the highways and public places in this Province.

Every person now owning or hereafter acquiring a motor vehicle shall for every such vehicle owned by him, file in the office of the secretary a statement of his name and address with a brief description of the vehicle to be registered, including the name of the maker, factory number, style of vehicle, and motor power, on a blank to be prepared and furnished by such secretary for that purpose, the fee for filing which shall be five dollars.

Every motor vehicle shall also at all times have the number assigned to it by the secretary displayed on the back of such vehicle, in such manner as to be plainly visible, the number to be in Arabic numerals, black or white ground, each not less than three inches in height and each stroke to be a width not less than half an inch; and also as part of such number, the initial letters of the Province in black or white ground, such letters to be not less than one inch in height.

No person shall operate a motor vehicle on a public highway at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard to the nature of the road, or to the presence of any horse or animal to pass and, if travelling in the same direction, use reasonable caution in the presence of such horse or animal; provided that in case such horse or animal appears badly frightened, or the person operating such motor vehicle is requested so to do, such person shall reduce the speed of such vehicle to a rate not exceeding 10 m.p.h. as may be reasonably necessary to prevent accident and insure the safety of others.

In case of accident to a person or property on a public highway due to the operation of a motor vehicle, the person operating such vehicle shall stop, and upon request of a person injured or any person present, give such person his name and address, and if not the owner the name and address of such owner.

Whenever a person operating a motor vehicle shall meet on a public highway, any other person riding or driving a horse or horses or other draft animals, or any other vehicle, the person so operating such motor vehicle shall reasonably turn the same to the left of the centre of such highway so as to pass without interference. Any such person so operating a motor vehicle shall on overtaking any such horse, draft animal or other vehicle, pass on the right of such horse, draft animal or other vehicle as soon as it is safe to do so, and shall not pass on the left of such vehicle, so as to allow free passage on the right. Any such person so operating a motor vehicle shall at the intersection of public highways keep to the left of the intersection of the centres of such highways, when turning to the left and pass to the left of such intersection when turning to the right. Nothing in this section, however, shall be construed as limiting the meaning and effect of the provisions of section 3 of this act.

Every motor vehicle while in use on a public highway shall be provided with good and sufficient brakes, and also with a suitable bell, horn or other sufficient means of signal, and shall during the period from one hour before sunset to one hour before sunrise display one or more lamps showing a white light, or white lights, visible within a reasonable distance, in the direction towards which such vehicle is proceeding showing the registered number of the vehicle in separate Arabic numerals not less than one inch in height and each stroke to be not less than one-quarter of an inch in width.

Nothing in this act shall be construed to curtail or abridge the right of any person to prosecute a civil action for damages by reason of injuries to person or property, resulting from the negligent use of a public highway by any person operating a motor vehicle.

Every person hereafter desiring to operate a motor vehicle as a chauffeur shall file in the office of the secretary on a blank to be supplied by such secretary, a statement which shall include the name and address and the trade name and motor power of the motor vehicle or vehicles he is able to operate, and shall pay a registration fee of two dollars.

The secretary shall thereupon file such statement in his book or index to be kept for that purpose, and assign him a number.

No person shall operate a motor vehicle as a chauffeur upon the public highway unless such person shall have complied with the requirements of this section.

The violations of any of the provisions of sub-section (5) of section 3, or of sub-section (7) of section 3, or of section 3 or section 5 of this act shall be deemed an offence under this act and the person guilty thereof shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred dollars for the first offence and not less than fifty dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars or imprisonment not exceeding thirty days or both, for a second offence, and not less than one hundred dollars nor more than two

hundred and fifty dollars or imprisonment not exceeding sixty days or both for a third or subsequent offence.

When any chauffeur shall have been convicted of a third or any subsequent offence against the provisions of this act the convicting justice shall forthwith certify to the secretary that such third or subsequent conviction having been made and the Chief Commissioner of Public Works may thereon order that the registration of such chauffeur so convicted as aforesaid be cancelled, and that no application for a new registration shall be received until such period as the Chief Commissioner may deem right, such period in no case to exceed one year from the date of such cancellation.

The violation of any other provision of this act shall be punishable by a fine not exceeding twenty dollars for a first offence; or fine not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than fifty dollars for a second offence, and a fine not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or both for a third or any subsequent offence. Not more than one conviction shall be made or recorded against any person for each day that he may persist in violating any of the offences under this act, that are of a continuous character.

In case the person operating a motor vehicle shall be taken into custody because of a violation of any provision of this act he shall be forthwith taken before a magistrate or justice of the peace in any city, town or village, and shall be entitled to an immediate hearing; and if such hearing be then held, he shall be released from custody on giving his personal undertaking to appear in answer for such violation at such time and place as shall then be fixed by such magistrate or justice of the peace, secured by the deposit of a sum not exceeding the maximum fine for the offence with which he is charged, or in lieu thereof, by leaving the motor vehicle being operated by such person, with a police officer or constable, or other person to be named by the magistrate or justice of the peace, in whose custody such vehicle shall be deposited in this section provided it shall be returned to the person depositing the same forthwith on such person being admitted to bail under the provisions of the Summary Convictions Act, and on return of the receipt or other security given at the time of such deposit, in case such undertaking with security, or such deposit shall not be made, the proceedings shall take place as in ordinary cases of arrest in the Summary Convictions Act.

Proceedings for the recovery of penalties under this act shall be taken and carried on under Chapter 123.

Any person whose tender is accepted shall within ten days after the acceptance thereof sign the contract, specifications and other documents required to be signed, and in any case of refusal or failure on the part of the party whose tender is accepted to complete and execute the contract with the Commissioners, the said cheque shall be forfeited to the Commissioners, as liquidated damages for such refusal or failure, and all contract rights acquired by the acceptance of the tender shall be null and void.

The cheques deposited by parties whose tenders are accepted will be paid only to the credit of the Receiver General of Canada as security for the due and faithful performance of the contract according to its terms.

The cheques deposited by parties whose tenders are rejected will be returned within ten days after the signing of the contract.
