Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family or any other person who has been domiciled in the Dominion of Canada for at least six months immediately preceding the date of his application, and who is at least 18 years of age, may apply to the Minister of the Interior for a grant of land in the Northwest Territories. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Mr. Wesley Heckbert, Bedeque, received a telegram Sunday stating that his son, Pte. Mark Heckbert, who enlisted in Summerside with the 105th Battalion, had been wounded on August 16th.

Mr. Pat. Daley, of Summerside, received a telegram Tuesday morning, stating his son, Pte. Frank Daley was wounded on August 16. Pte. Daley enlisted in the old 105th, and was transferred to the 106th in England.

Word was received by Mr. Andrew Ahearn, Summerside, Sunday, that his son, Pte. James Ahearn, Infantry, was wounded in the right thigh on August 16th. Pte. Ahearn was wounded before in April. He enlisted in Charlottetown in the 105th.

The sad news has been received that Pte. Alfred Bernard, son of Mr. Antoine Bernard, Summerside was killed in action on August 15th. He enlisted in Summerside in the 105th Battalion, and went to France as a member of the 26th Pte. Bernard was nineteen years old.

Mrs. Minnie McIntyre, Charlotte town has been informed that her husband 713195 Pte. Robert Verney McIntyre, Infantry, is officially reported admitted to twenty general Hospital at Camiers, Aug. 16th, gunshot wound in wrist. Further particulars will be sent later Private McIntyre crossed from this City with the 105th going over to France with his first draft.

Word was received by his parents on Sunday that Pte. James M. McLellan, Grand River, Lot 14, received a gunshot wound in the head on August 15th. Pte. McLellan was a clerk in the Red Cross Drugstore, Summerside, before enlisting. Other casualties are: Garlestone Pendleton, Richmond, missing; Basil Praught, Richmond, wounded in hand; Joseph Scully (Miac) Lennox Island, shell concussion.

Word was received by her mother on Saturday that Nursing Sister Beatrice McDonald, North Bedeque, had lost the sight of her right eye in the hospital in which she was engaged in France. The report was confirmed by a wire from her brother, Major

Mr. Hammond J. Thompson, of Summerside, has also received a telegram conveying the sad news that his brother Pte. George Thompson, Infantry, son of Mr. Wm. Thompson, Belmont, Lot 16, had been killed in action on August 15th. Pte. Thompson enlisted in Edmonton shortly after the war started, and had been at the front for about two years, going through some of the biggest battles in which the Canadians took part. He was wounded twice. Pte. Thompson was twenty-four years of age.

Hughes, Infantry, officially reported admitted four general Hospital, Dannes Cameries, Aug. 20th Gun shot wound right arm compound fracture shoulder. Severe. Private Hughes who is attached to the 3rd Can. Pioneer Battalion (48) B. E. F., France, enlisted in the American Legion in Edmonton on the 9th Battalion, Toronto, on Nov. 20, 1915. He left the 9th in a draft for the 4th Pioneers Battalion, England.

Mr. John M. Hughes, 311 Fitzroy St., city, is in receipt of a telegram announcing that Pte. John M. Hughes was admitted to No. 4 General Hospital, Cameries on August 20th with a gun shot wound in the right arm, which caused a severe compound fracture. Private Hughes enlisted in Edmonton, Alta., in the American Legion, for the 9th Battalion of Toronto, Ont., and left on November 20th, 1915, in a draft for the 4th Pioneer Battalion to England.

Mr. S. J. Whitlock of this city has received a telegram from Ottawa, stating that his son, Driver Gordon H. Whitlock, artillery, is officially reported admitted to 16th General Hospital, Lestreport, on August 16th, with a gun shot wound in the face. Gordon Whitlock enlisted in Sydney in the 36th Battery, and went to France with that battery, which was then under command of Captain D. A. McKinnon.
