FIRE PREVENTION

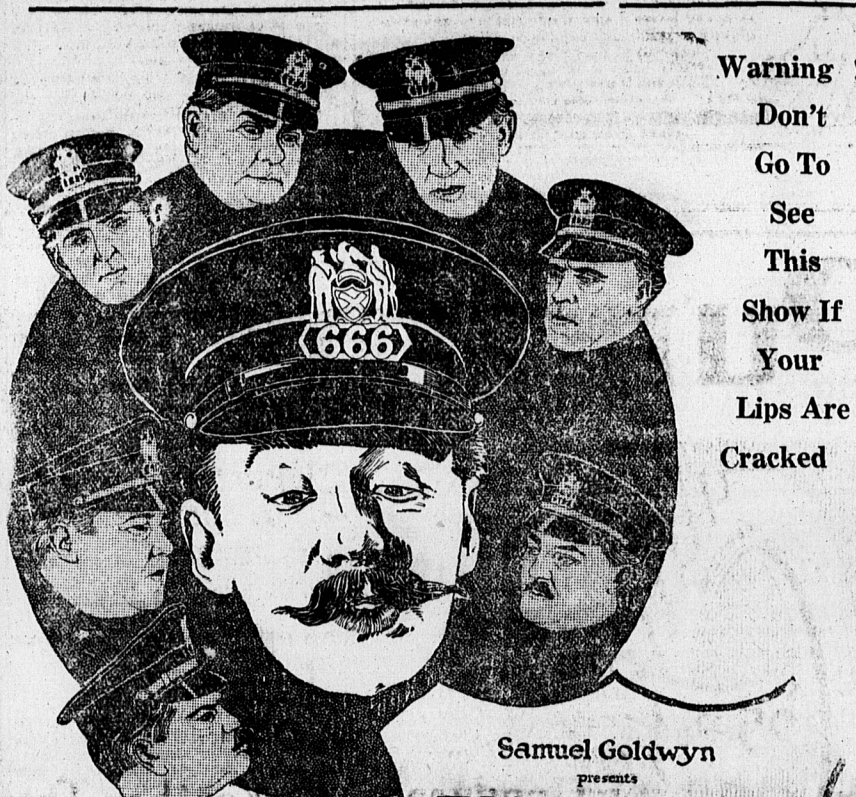

Cattle Embargo Statement.

LONDON, April 23 - The most striking recent development of the Canadian cattle embargo situation is the thoroughly ex-parte statement on the subject which has been delivered and issued broadcast by the Department of Agriculture for Ireland. It sets forth a number of arguments why the embargo should not be lifted, and the whole document, in view of Lloyd George's decision to leave the matter to a Royal Commission, is an astounding misconception of the function of a Government department. While the matter is practically subjudice, the department issues this report, in which it is claimed that the proposal to import Canadian cattle as a means towards lowering meat prices is a speculative and fallacious theory and that the admission of Canadian store cattle would not increase by one beast or by one hundred weight the quantity of beef now admissible, dead or alive, to British ports. The report was printed before the reference of the matter to the Royal Commission, but has been distributed within the last few days. It is of interest that the Department of Agriculture and Technical Instructions, which issued the report, has as its president the Chief Secretary for Ireland, Sir Hamar Greenwood, himself a Canadian, while the vice-president is the Right Hon. Hugh T. Barrie. The cattle embargo question is an issue on which many Anglo-Canadians here have yet to take one side or the other. It has not escaped notice that Lord Desborough, whose name is one of the three most prominently mentioned in connection with the Governor-Generalship of Canada, voted against the Dominion on every show of hands at the big meeting in Guild Hall, London, on March 17, where he was a representative of the British Farmers' Dairy Association.

Emergency Tariff May be Levied. NORTH PORTAL, Sask., April 23 - Much Saskatchewan wheat has been sent across the international boundary line during the past few days by Canadian shippers to the order of United States buyers and millers, to avoid the duty imposed by the Young Tariff Bill which is expected to come into effect soon in that country.
