Deadlock Maintained

PARIS, Dec. 11.—The deadlock between the council of ambassadors and the German delegates over the question of Germany's armaments was as strong as ever this morning. The ambassadors were adamant in refusing to certify that Germany had fulfilled the conditions requisite to the overturning of supervision of armament to the League of Nations instead of leaving it in the hands of the inter-armed military commission.

Agreement Reached

GENEVA, Dec. 12.—A complete agreement whereby inter-Allied control over Germany's armaments will cease was reached today at the meeting of the Council of the League of Nations. Supervision is placed in the hands of the League of Nations. M. Briand, Foreign Minister of France, and Gustav Stresemann, German Foreign Secretary, made the announcement that an accord has been reached. M. Briand added that personally he was well satisfied.

Music Hall Actresses Lose Lives

ROME, Dec. 11.—Four music hall actresses were killed when a fire caused by a short circuit swept through the Apollo theatre in the midst of the performance tonight. The screams of panic-stricken women in the audience and the roar of the flames were heard in an adjoining theatre, where a performance of Cavalleria Rusticana was in progress, causing a stampede.

Shipway From Ocean to Great Lakes

(Special to the Guardian) WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—A report on the advisability of constructing a shipway from the ocean to the great lakes via the St. Lawrence will be submitted to President Coolidge within ten days, members of United States Commission of the Project announced today after a meeting with secretary of commerce Hoover. The findings and data of the international engineering board which has surveyed the route and made estimates of cost, are taken up at the session. Other information bearing upon the project and upon the alternative plan for construction of a waterway through New York state was also studied. Mr. Hoover is chairman of the commission. The Canadian government has appointed a similar body, which is now studying the engineering records.

Will Marry Crown Prince of Italy

(Canadian Press) BUCHAREST, Dec. 12.—Princess Helena will marry Prince Humbert, Crown Prince of Italy, within six months if King Ferdinand lives, or as soon thereafter as the period of mourning ceases, should the monarch die. Associated Press has been given this information in circles close to the Royal Palace. Helena, youngest daughter of King Ferdinand and Queen Marie, is 17 years old; Humbert is 22.

Hon. J. E. Sinclair Slated For Cabinet Position

OTTAWA, Dec. 11.—Two further cabinet appointments are expected next week. One will be that of Hon. J. E. Sinclair, of Prince Edward Island, to the new post of Minister of Fisheries the present combined portfolio of Marine and Fisheries to be divided into two portfolios with Hon. Arthur Cardin, remaining as Minister of Marine. The other is that of the naming of Edouard A. LaPierre, of Nipissing, Ontario to the post of minister without portfolio and representing the French speaking minority in Ontario. The Liberals take as a precedent for this latter move the appointment of Mr. Melgren last summer without portfolio to represent the same people. Mr. LaPierre's appointment will also be regarded by the Liberals as a reward in addition to the selection of Peter Heenan, of Kenora in the matter rests with their superior the foreign ministers of the allied countries, who are conferring here in Geneva. MONTREAL, Dec. 11.—John C. Douglas, M. P., Antigonish-Guyaboro, N. S., and formerly Attorney General of Nova Scotia, died suddenly here tonight. Mr. Douglas arrived here tonight from Ottawa. He went to his room in the hotel at which he was staying and shortly afterwards telephoned to the office stating that he was ill. A physician was sent for but despite anything that could be done Mr. Douglas expired, apparently from a heart seizure. OPENING OF PARLIAMENT WAS MOST BRILLIANT IN MANY YEARS

Official Guests Filled Senate Chamber to Overflowing; Many Women Present—Speech From the Throne Contains no Very Contentious Legislation.

OTTAWA, Dec. 11.—Yesterday's opening of parliament was the most brilliant in many years. Official guests filled the Senate chamber to overflowing. Scores of women in full dress had to be accommodated in the vestibule of the Senate which was turned into an auditorium for the occasion. Lord Willington read the Speech from the Throne for the first time in his term as Governor General. As anticipated it contains no very contentious legislation. Beside him were Premier Mackenzie King in Windsor uniform, and Senator Raoul Dandurand, government leader in the Senate. Bishops, Senators, Judges, soldiers, privy councillors in full dress lent color to the scene. As many women as could be accommodated filled out the chamber with a riot of color. The brief ceremony over, the Senate adjourned and the members of the House of Commons returned to their own chamber to transact some routine business before early adjournment until Monday.

A motion to give the Speech from the Throne precedence in the brief pre-Christmas meeting of parliament was adopted in the Commons. In that chamber, the address in reply will be moved by L. Auger, (Liberal, Prescott, Ont.) and in the Senate, on Tuesday by Senator W. A. Buchanan, (Alberta). The seconders will be E. A. McPherson, (Liberal, Portage La Prairie), in the Commons and Senator Onesiphore Turgeon (New Brunswick), in the Senate. As soon as the House got down to routine business the government proceeded to cover the big table with blue books, reports, etc. Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance tabled estimates for the present fiscal year, showing that about \$65,000,000 remain to be voted before a supply bill can be brought in. It was the first reminder of the grist of unfinished business from last session.

Hon. James Malcolm, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and Hon. Ferdinand Renfert, Secretary of State, each made their first speech as members of the Cabinet when they tabled some documents. Each was given a round of applause as they rose. The Prime Minister when he came in from the Senate, was again warmly applauded by his supporters.
