

A Third President Falls by an Assassin's Cruel Hand.

THE PRESIDENT FATALLY SHOT!

At the Pan American Temple of Music in Buffalo
Yesterday Afternoon.

THE ASSASSIN FIRED WHILE SHAKING HANDS

Displaying Fiendish Treachery—The Murderer Well Dressed but Unknown—He is Arrested—Two Frightful Wounds in the Chest And Abdomen—The President in Hospital and Still Conscious—The Nation Thrilled With Horror—The Murders of Lincoln and Garfield Recalled.

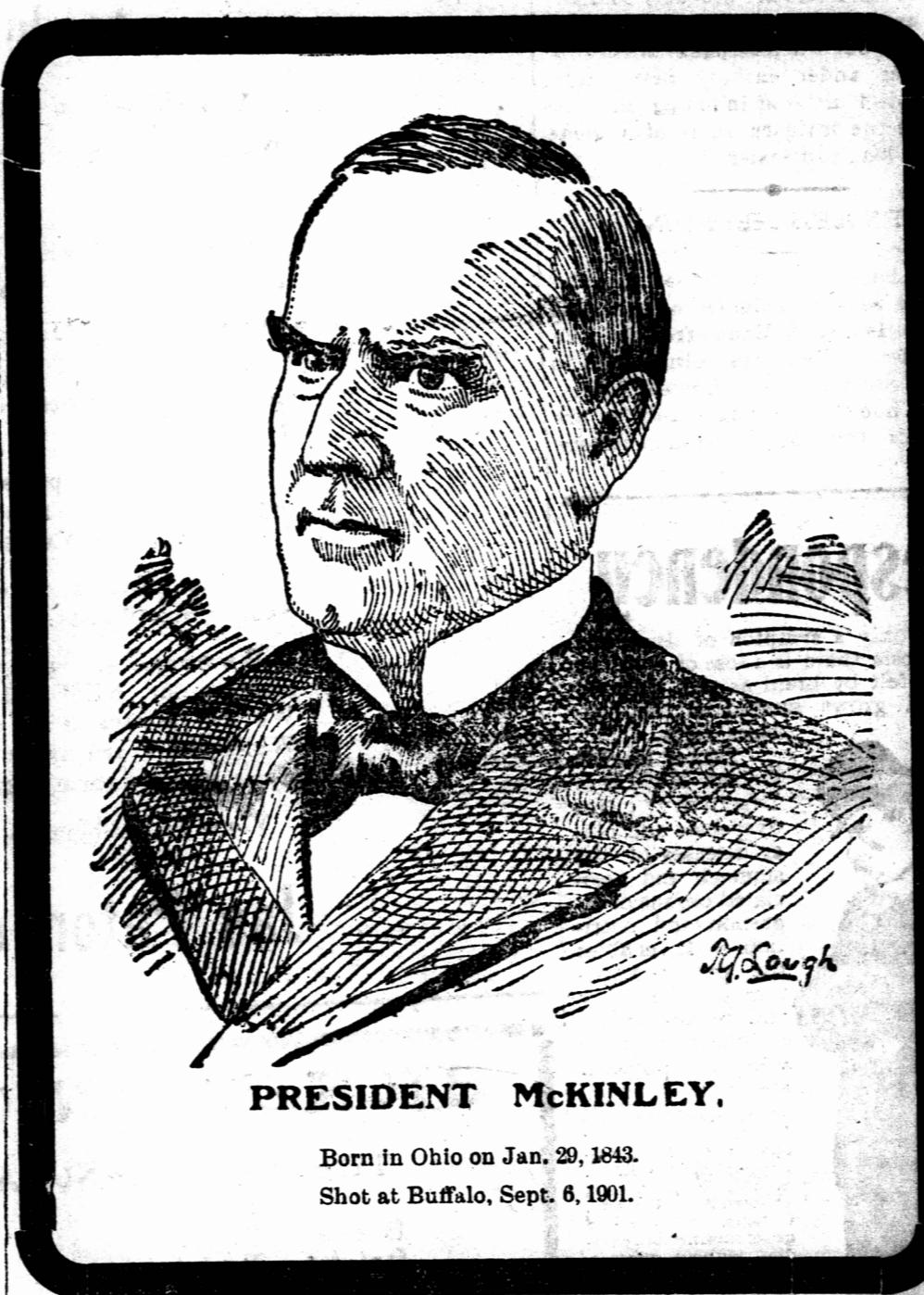
PRESIDENT MCKINLEY FATALLY SHOT!

BUFFALO, N. Y., September 6.—(Special.)—A furor of excitement was caused here this afternoon by the announcement that President McKinley had been shot THE DEED DONE IN THE TEMPLE OF MUSIC.

The President was shot in the beautiful Temple of Music. He arrived yesterday, gave an address, and with his party made a partial tour of the various departments. The attendance yesterday and to-day was enormous in consequence of the President's visit.

THE ASSASSIN FIRED REPEATEDLY.

The shots were fired at close range and took effect in the President's breast and stomach.



PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

Born in Ohio on Jan. 29, 1843.
Shot at Buffalo, Sept. 6, 1901.

HIS CONDITION SERIOUS—HE IS IN HOSPITAL.

The President was quickly removed to the Hospital in the Pan-American grounds where he now lies attended by physicians and personal friends. His condition is serious. Excitement is most intense.

LATER.
WAS SHOT WHILE SHAKING HANDS WITH HIS MURDERER.
BUFFALO, N. Y., September 6.—(Special.)—The President was shot by a well-dressed man.
He was speaking with the President and shaking hands with him. The assassin fired the shots with his left hand while his right grasped the hand of the President.
THE MURDERER UNDER ARREST.
The assassin was quickly seized, disarmed and placed under arrest. So far he has not been identified, but is believed to be an Anarchist.
THE WOUNDS BELIEVED TO BE FATAL.
The President is fatally wounded. One shot passed entirely through his left breast. The other entered the abdomen.
The President is said to be resting easily and retains his consciousness.

BRIEF SKETCH OF THE PRESIDENT'S LIFE.

William McKinley, President of the United States, was born at Niles, Trumbull County, Ohio, January 29, 1843. He served in the Civil War, attaining the rank of Major. He was Attorney of Stark County, Ohio, 1869-71; was Republican member of Congress from Ohio, 1877-91; was Chairman of the Platform Committee in the Republican National Conventions of 1884 and 1888; was Chairman of the Wage and Means Committee in Congress 1890-91 which Committee reported the famous McKinley Tariff Bill of 1890; was defeated as a candidate for Congress in 1890; was elected Governor of Ohio by the Republicans in 1891 and re-elected in 1893. He was elected President in 1896 and re-elected to that office in 1900.

PREVIOUS PRESIDENTIAL ASSASSINATIONS.

The attempt to kill President McKinley recalls the fact that two previous Presidents died by the hand of assassins.

THE DEATH OF PRESIDENT LINCOLN IN 1865.

Abraham Lincoln shortly after being inaugurated in his second term was shot by John Wilkes Booth, at Ford's Theatre, Washington, April 4, 1865 and died on the following day. Booth escaped, but was finally discovered at Bowling Green, Virginia and resisting arrest he was shot there April 23, 1865.

MURDER OF PRESIDENT GARFIELD IN 1881.

President Garfield was shot at a railway station, Washington, by Charles Guiteau, July 2, 1881. He lingered till September 19 of that year, and died at Elberon, New Jersey, whither he had been removed. Guiteau, this assassin after a long trial was found guilty and was hanged June 30, 1882, nearly a year after Garfield was shot.

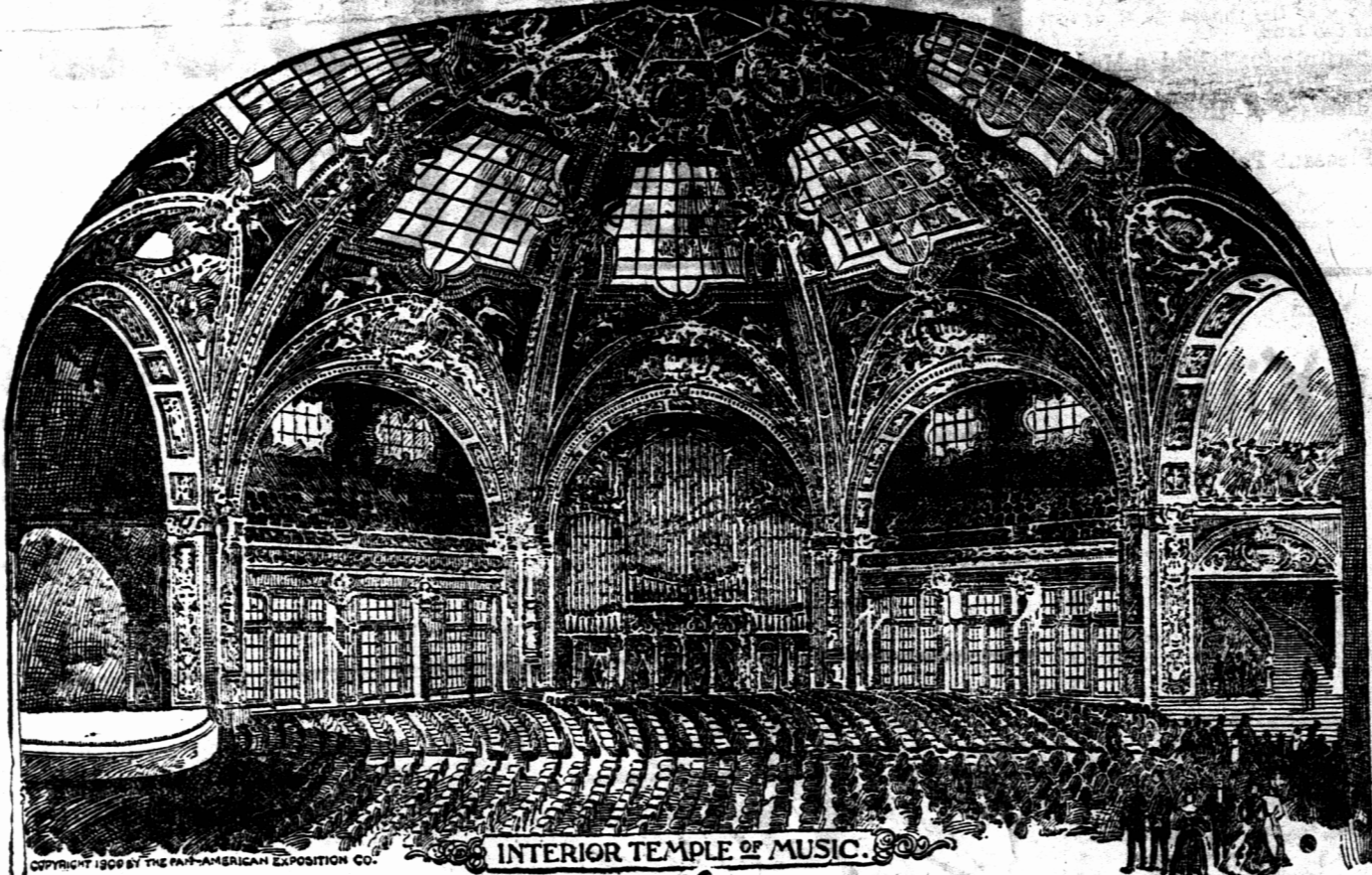

GALLANT CAPTURE

Of Boer Commando by
Major Scobel.

NOTABLE PRISONERS.

The British Losses Light—
100 Prisoners and 200
Horses Captured.

BOER COMMANDS CAPTURED.
LONDON Sept. 6.—(Special.)—Lotler's entire commando has been taken by Major Scobel south of Petersburg.
Lord Kitchener's report of the capture states that 19 Boers were killed 59 wounded and 62 captured unwounded.
SOME NOTED PRISONERS.
The prisoners include Commandants Lotler and Bredt, Field Cornets Kruger and Lt. Kruger and Lt. Shoeman.
Among the killed were two Vasters, notable rebels.
THE BRITISH LOSSES.
The British had ten killed and eight wounded.
Another despatch states that 200 horses were captured and places the prisoner at 100.

ANOTHER AWFUL SHIPWRECK.

VICTORIA B. C. Sept. 6. [Special.] The steamer Meowera which arrived Thursday brought news of the wreck of the barque Lizzie Bell of Liverpool bound from Wellington for Newcastle.
Of the crew of 18 only 6 survived. Some boats were lost by capsizing.
Two persons died in the boat and two others who had just strength to get ashore were found dead on the rocks.
