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37 Bodies From Caribou Sinking Are Recovered

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Oct. 20 (CP Cable)—Of the 137 persons who perished in the torpedo sinking of the steamship Caribou last week, 37 bodies had been recovered tonight, and of these 30 had been identified, definitely or tentatively.

Thirty-five of the bodies were found off Newfoundland and brought to this country, and of these 29 were identified, two of the identifications being tentative.

Two bodies were brought to Sydney, N. S., the day of the sinking and one identified there.

Identify of three was established here today. They were those of Mrs. (Rev.) Gordon Allan, 26 St. John's, formerly of Bathurst, N. B.; William A. Girth of Albany, N. Y.; and Adam W. Sims, Toronto.

(The missing list as issued at Sydney contained the name of William H. Gerth, Camden, N. J., apparently this is the same man.)

Tentative identifications made today were those of Mrs. Richard Skinner of Halifax and her five-year-old son Basil. Authorities said that from pictures in a Halifax newspaper it was "highly probable" their bodies were at the morgue here. A daughter Nancy, 2, also is missing.

Still unidentified after being brought to Newfoundland are the bodies of three women, two children and one man. The children are girls, aged about six months and one year, respectively. At Sydney, one identified boy has been

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Suggests Cut In Size Of Papers

OTTAWA, Oct. 20 (CP)—Joseph Bradette, Liberal member of Parliament for the Ontario constituency of Cochrane, suggested today at a meeting of a House of Commons sub-committee on wartime salvage that Canadian newspapers might well be reduced in size to conserve materials and labor.

The sub-committee heard evidence from C. V. Hopper, administrator of boxes, packages and waste paper in the Wartime Prices and Trade Board, on the prospect of a returning demand for waste paper to be used in manufacture of packages.

Mr. Bradette said it was necessary that newspapers be maintained, but when I see double-page advertisements of something at a time when the Government is asking us to save all for the war, it seems a bad thing.

Mr. Bradette said he wondered why the Federal Government had not "tackled" this situation and added: "While I relish the comic strips I think we could do away with them. We could very well have smaller papers. Several periodicals have been started since the war began, although we have been well-served by the present press."
