Brown Berry Wins Circuit Event At Rockingham Park

Three Year Old Qualifies As Favorite For The Famous Hambletonian Classic.

Salem, N. H., Aug. 2.—(A.P.)—The three-year-old Brown Berry, owned by J. L. Lyle of Plainfield, N. J., qualified as the favorite for the famous Hambletonian classic by capturing two firsts and a second in competition with 11 other crack trotters in the \$5,000 American Stake event, feature of today's Grand Circuit programme at Rockingham Park.

NEW TRACK RECORD

Brown Berry also stole much of the thunder from the really great trotting turned in by Calume Crusader, the Arden homesteader, stable's crack entry in the 2.11 class trot. This son of Truax, with Wil Dickerson driving, broke the three heat record for stallions with his winning times of 2.02, 2.01 1/2 and 2.03. He set a new track trotting record in his second start and his total time for his three trips about the track was only a quarter-second under the record three-heat trotting mark set by Tronia Britton two years ago. Peter Dispatch was the former stallion record-holder.
