The members of the Methodist Church, Bridgetown, held their annual missionary meeting on Friday, Nov. 27. The pastor being unavoidably absent, the chair was occupied by Rev. Mr. Lawson, who was assisted in his onerous duties by Rev. Mr. Bell. The program of the evening consisted of addresses by the above mentioned gentlemen, who seemed to be endowed by more than the ordinary missionary spirit, with music interspersed by the choir. Mr. Bell confined himself to mission work in general, while Mr. Lawson made an earnest appeal for China. The spiritual tide is rising and the reverend gentleman hoped the day is not far distant when the worshippers of Confucius, Buddha, and Mohammed will be so moved that the face of the globe will be changed and succeeding generations shall witness the Mongolian race join hand in hand with the Anglo-Saxon to evangelize the world. No doubt this earnest appeal will not be in vain as her walls of prejudice have been thrown down and her gates swung open to Christian tuition. She is no longer a "walled China."
