PICNIC TODAY.—The postponed Hampshire S. S. Picnic will take place this afternoon, 1209.

BISHOPS PALACE.—The remodeling of the Bishop's Palace, Charlottetown, which was badly damaged by the fire which destroyed the Cathedral, is now well under way, under the direction of the contractor, Mr. Michael Walsh. When completed the interior will be practically new and differently arranged from its former lay out. On the ground floor the apartment formerly used as a reception room is being converted into a bedroom, office and bath room for the Bishop. The former parlor will be converted into an office for the Pastor. In addition to these there will be two waiting rooms, a secretary's office, a bed room and a vault, on this floor. On the second floor new features will be a chapel, an Arch Bishop's room and a bath which will also be on this floor. The library will be on the third floor, which will also contain 4 bed rooms, 3 living rooms and baths. There will be another vault in the basement besides 3 cellars, coal room and furnace room. A verandah will be added to the south end of the main building.

In addition to the main building an ell will be built 52 feet by 33 feet, the same height as the main building. In it will be contained the dining room, kitchen and Sisters' dining room on the first floor and on the second floor the Sisters' community room, 5 bed rooms, linen room and bath. There will be 9 bed rooms on the third floor. A verandah will also be built on the northern end of the addition. The building will be fitted with the latest modern convenience and will have a new heating system. When completed it will be one of the finest structures of the kind in Canada.

PROHIBITION MATTERS.—The Anti-Treating clause of the Prohibition Act is already serving a good purpose. It appears as if it were either misunderstood or some cases ignored. Those who have violated this law and have been brought to task for it, will not be likely in the near future either to ignore or pretend to misunderstand it. Some few weeks ago the first cases under the new clause were tried. One young man pleaded guilty and was let off without being asked to pay a fine. The magistrate stated to him, that he was being leniently dealt with because it was the first offence under this new section of the Act. It appears as if the warning given through the publication of this case and at other times through the columns of the press was not sufficient. Some will still persist in this disgraceful habit. As a result of this four cases were tried only this other day in Summerside. It appears that on the express one Saturday night a few young men had produced a bottle and began passing it round. The train had not gone far until a fierce row was in process. One young man a native of Alberton, Fraser by name, was thrown off the train and badly hurt. These cases which came before the magistrate the other day were the outcome of this fracas. The persons convicted were Elijah McArthur, Charles Lewis and Michael Thomas. It is expected that the others who were summoned to appear for this same offence will also be convicted. These cases will surely be a warning to those who have been in the habit of indulging in this demoralizing and slavish and disgusting practice.

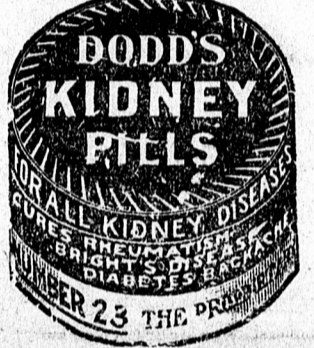

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

LONDON, Aug. 27 (Special).—Two of the most powerful native ruling families of British India were united today when Princess Indira, only daughter of the reigning Maharajah Gaekwar of Baroda, was married here to Prince Jitendra, son of the Maharajah of Cochin-Beha, after a romantic courtship. The most intense interest had been aroused in the attachment of the couple, whose wedding had first been fixed to take place in India on May 5, but was suddenly broken off, after which the bride and her parents sailed from Bombay for England, and were followed by Prince Jitendra. It is understood that the Gaekwar finally yielded to the importunities of his daughter and consented to the marriage, at which, however, he was not present. The bridegroom created something of a sensation this morning by appearing at the hotel in his magnificent Indian robes of white silk, heavily embroidered with gold. Following the ceremony there was a wedding breakfast in which thirty guests participated. The bride's father and brother, Shrimai Jaisingrao, are both well known in the United States where the latter studied at Harvard. Her mother, the Maharani, is a woman of advanced ideas and is the author of a book on the position of women in India.

VIENNA, Aug. 20 (Special).—The eighty-third birthday of Emperor Francis Joseph, the oldest monarch, which he is passing at Ischl, an Upper Austrian summer resort, is being celebrated throughout the dual monarchy today with great festivities. The Emperor, who is in excellent health, is surrounded by his family. A special feature of the observances was the unveiling of a statue of the ruler at the Technical Military Academy at Moedling, near Vienna. The occasion was made particularly interesting to military officers because of the presence of General Canova, the Italian commander-in-chief, during the Tripolitan war, who was a student at the academy.



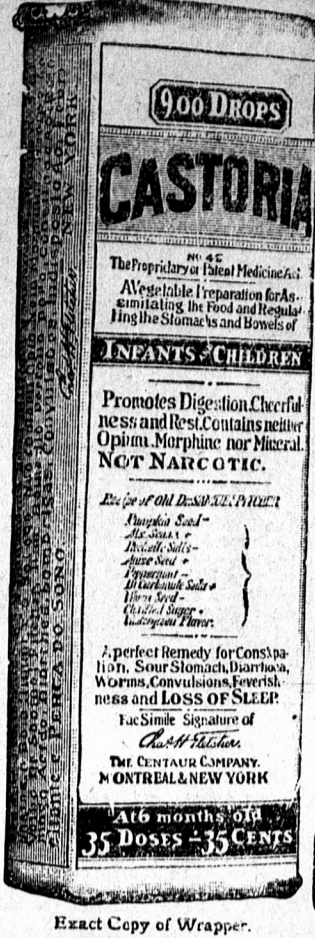
