The bidding was decidedly brisk, and some extraordinary prices, no doubt the highest ever recorded for cricket bats, were paid. A bat given by Dr. W. G. Grace, the Grand Old Man of cricket, brought £50, one presented by V. Trumper, the best of the Australian team which has been touring England, and by many held to be the finest batsman in the world, £42, and one from the Indian, Ranjitsinhji, £13 13s. A common price was £5, and the sale realized several hundreds of pounds.

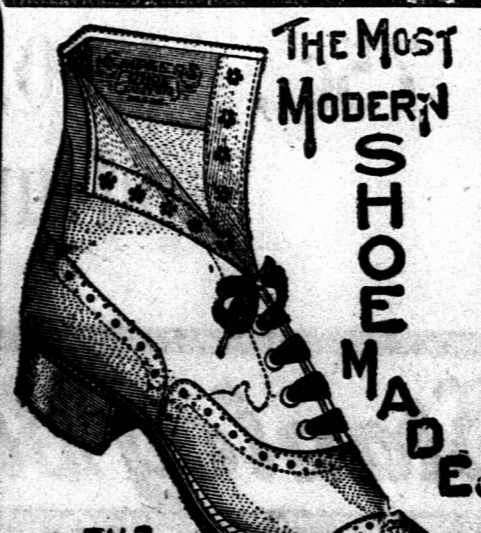
