Anglican Girls Camp

A ten day camp under the sponsorship of the Prince Edward Island Diocesan Women's Auxiliary, was held at the Anglican Church Centre, Crapaud, from July 23 to August 4. It was attended by forty-three girls between the ages of eight and sixteen years. The camp was divided into Seniors (12-16 years) and Juniors (8-12 years). These camp sites were kept quite separate and with the exception of swimming and meals, all the activities and duties were carried out within the two camps.

The camp program started at 7:00 a.m. each morning with physical exercises, flag break, and short morning devotions in the church. After breakfast and the routine duties that present themselves after eating and sleeping, the girls were fortunate in having Mrs. Church, Camp Director train them in choir work. On our Sunday in camp the girls, including the regular church choir and sang Evensong. With such a short time for preparation this magnificent accomplishment could only be attributed to excellent musical direction and the enthusiasm and complete cooperation of the girls.

The Women's Auxiliary is to be commended on procuring the services of such a capable and talented director as Mrs. Harold Church, from Quebec. Other members of the staff were Rev. S. J. Armstrong and Rev. A. E. Piercey, chaplains; Miss Ada Harris, Quartermaster; Miss K. Copp, Assistant to Mrs. Church; Miss Laura Clapp, Camp nurse; Miss Eleanor Clapp, handicrafts; Miss Audrey Coles, handicraft assistant; Miss Florine Evans, Sports Director; Miss Cecilia Donald, assistant sports director; Miss Maude Haines, Cook.

A varied and interesting program included singing, dancing, singing and dramatics for Seniors and a musical play and musical expression for Juniors. Evening programs were varied and consisted of a sports evening, ball game, camp fires, and a hike. Two movies were brought to the camp through the kindness of the Red Cross Water Safety Program and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

Rain or shine many of the girls had a swim every day. Swimming classes were conducted by Miss Florine Evans and many of the girls received their Red Cross Water Safety awards.

Miss Eleanor Clapp supervised handicraft periods and helped the enthusiastic campers to make many useful and beautiful articles of leather. The project of textile painting produced many and varied designs on scarves, bandannas and curtains for the camp.

At the conclusion of camp residents were invited to attend a display of country and folk dancing by the Seniors while the Juniors presented the story of Hansel and Gretel in song and dance and also the Ballet of Cinderella. The crepe paper costumes and hand properties of these numbers gave the whole performance the note of a finished production. The evening was brought to a close with a campfire and awards were made for outstanding achievements in all phases of camp life.

Leaders Map Plan On Dollar Crisis

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11 (CP)—British, United States and Canadian cabinet officers today mapped a four-point attack on Britain's dollar crisis.

As the three-power financial talks entered their second day, however, the United States served notice that its Congress may have to be consulted before it can yield to one of Britain's most important requests.

Treasury Secretary Snyder, the chief American delegate, told a press conference he does not think he could permit Britain to discriminate temporarily against American goods without first getting Congressional approval.

The British delegates, have requested Snyder to waive article nine in the 1946 British loan agreement to permit them to start this discrimination.

The Britons said it would help them save scarce dollars.

Snyder disclosed that the top foreign-policy and economic leaders of the three countries have agreed to set up four special "working groups" to expedite their discussion. These will consider Britain's requests for:

1. More freedom to spend Marshall-plan dollars outside the United States. This would allow Britain to buy Canadian wheat, bacon, cheese, eggs and other items with her Marshall-plan allocations.
2. Streamlining United States customs rules. British and Canadian experts claim these regulations now are so antiquated and complex that they discourage foreign manufacturers from sending their goods to the United States.
3. More purchases of strategic raw materials from British sources. Britain wants the United States to speed up buying of tin, rubber, industrial diamonds, mica and other minerals so it can have the dollars to use during the present money emergency.
4. A greater flow of private and United States government dollars into overseas British territories and Commonwealth countries. Britain believes she can increase production in these areas and thus earn more dollars if the United States government and private business men are willing to take the risk.
