SOME IGNITION INFORMATION

Generator, battery and coil are the basis of current and voltage supply in the conventional car. The generator delivers electric energy either direct to the electric system for lighting and ignition or to the battery in order to reverse its chemical action and "charge" it. The battery, being kept in such chemical condition that it can generate current when its terminals are connected with a current drain such as a starter motor, functions as a reserve when the engine is idle or the generator is not operating fast enough to deliver the desired current output. The coil "steps up" the voltage of either generator or battery for ignition purposes.

SECOND MAKES GOOD BRAKE

Just as second speed makes the best combination for a quick getaway so does it make one of the best ways of stopping quickly in an emergency. When the speed is simply a matter of skidding past a few small cars, and stopping again behind a street car some two hundred feet ahead, remaining in second will be found handy for the entire job of speeding up and slowing down. Nine-tenths of the job can be done with the throttle, which is a bit closer to the ideal in speed control.

HELPS TO STOP THE NOISE

One reason why the filler and drain plugs of the transmission, as well as the cover plate, should be kept tight at all times is to deaden the natural noises of the whirling gears.

DON'T MAKE EASE TOO EASY

Ease at the wheel is a commendable accomplishment, but like everything else it can be carried too far. A case in point is the habit of sprawling the hands all over the steering wheel sector. Suppose the driver is obliged to make a quick turn and a stray finger happens to get wedged between a spider of the wheel and the gas control? It has happened to many drivers and is one reason why many manufacturers have dispensed with the quadrant idea, shortening the gas and spark controls.

ONE NOT TO WORRY ABOUT

Because springs seem to be very flat is no cause for worry, provided the car is supposed to show springs in this condition. It is claimed for semi-elliptic springs that side-sway is greatly lessened through their use because almost flat suspension is offered. This, of course, is comparing a semi-elliptic spring with a three-quarters elliptic of the same length.

MAKES THE TASK SIMPLER

Many drivers seem to have trouble trying to let in the clutch gently. A simple, yet effective way of engaging the clutch easily is to rest the heel of the foot on the floor of the car, pressing out the clutch by a lever-like motion of the ball of the foot. With the foot in this position and the ball of the foot pressed down the driver will find it rather difficult to let the clutch in quickly. He finds that it is necessary to exert a bit of effort to draw the ball of the foot back, and in doing so he cannot help but engage the clutch by gentle degrees.

WHERE THE NOISE IS FOUND

Noises that have their origin in rough treatment of the transmission will be found to center more on the second gear speeds than on the low. Except when the clutch drags, a mesh of the low speed gears is accomplished while they are at rest. The high speed gears are never concerned in this sort of trouble because the high speed sliding gear simply locks into the clutch or main driving gear, side to side, and does not mesh with it.
