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IMPROVEMENTS TO COUNCIL CHAMBERS - The Council Chamber, City Building, at present being painted and re-decorated. EARLY GRAIN ENCOURAGING - Farmers will be interested to know that the grain, planted at the Experimental Farm, at the earliest date of April 24, is "heading out" at present, and gives every appearance of being a bumper crop. It is a long piece ahead of other crops planted later. Grain which was planted on the ground the first week of May, is also doing exceedingly well. On the other hand the outlook for corn is not the brightest. This crop is just coming up at the Farm.

LOCAL MEN PROMOTED - The promotion of S.A.C. Scarth, Charlottetown, P.E.I., to Lieutenant to Acting Lieutenant Commander is announced in a press release from the Department of National Defence. GOOD PROSPECTS FOR CROPS - The fine weather of the past few days has greatly improved farm crops in the province which have been retarded by cool weather late this spring. Dr. J. A. Clark, Superintendent of the Experimental Farm, said last night. Crops are still about ten days behind those of this time last year, however. Prospects are good for a bumper crop this season. The season is finished especially in clover and timothy which is growing rapidly at present. The damp weather, which retarded general crops, was a boon to pasture land which is now in excellent condition. It has been in many years. It is estimated that Island farmers have this year that 10 per cent fewer potatoes than last year. This is due to the fact that the soil is not so dry. Prospects for this crop look good. Most of the potatoes have been put in the ground owing to the backward season. Root crops are very promising. Marjories at the farm are outstanding and have reached the stage of four inches. On the whole crops look much better than last year.

HUNTING DOGS RUNNING AT LARGE - Numerous complaints have reached the Royal Canadian Mounted Police regarding depredations of hunting dogs running at large. Complaints are being dealt mainly with losses to rabbits and young black ducks. Hungarian partridge and pheasants are beginning to appear in the woods and broods and from now on both the species of game birds will suffer. It is understood that drastic action will be taken by game authorities, and owners of hunting dogs, providing they value their dogs, will be doing a wise act in shutting them in an empty fox pen, or in a cage, or in a long wire trap which a chain and ring are attached. Otherwise it may be a case of Rover failing to return from one of his forays.

LOBSTER TRAPS TAKE A TOLL OF HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE - Game officials have for some time been checking on reports that Hungarian partridges are being trapped in empty lobster traps piled on the shores. Just what tempts the birds to enter is somewhat of a mystery. Food is apparently not the chief attraction as they have been known to enter perfectly new traps. Maybe it is with the instinct for shelter from wind and pests and roving footed predators. Whatever the cause, fishermen report finding numerous dead Hungarians in their lobster traps when the season starts opening. They are requested to leave the doors open on the bottom tier of traps, so as to give the birds an avenue of escape if they enter the trap through the lobster's entrance.

Interpreting The War (Continued from page 1) flank are strongly bolstered by the lake system through which the Estonian-Russian border runs. The Nazi attack in the Pskov-Ostrov sector is aimed at turning the line from the south. It seems unquestionable that Russian defences are extra strong there, and probably developed in great depth. There are any indications of German-Finnish progress of consequence on the other exposed flank of Leningrad, the Karelian Isthmus. It was primarily to prevent the German from reaching the Gulf of Finland, that the Dnieper line was held up, as Moscow claims.
