The object of the conference is educational and inspirational. It is also being held to help secure the young men of the formative years for the Christian life and to develop all round character. It is taken for granted that clergymen and Sunday School teachers and Y. M. C. A. workers are interested and will assist in every way in securing a large attendance of boys. On their arrival in the city, representative clergymen will meet, entertain and see the boys to the Y. M. C. A. for registration when they will be furnished with badges and given information as to entertainment.
