Rev. Dr. Chaisson Honored At Rustico

Yesterday afternoon an important function was consummated in the Parish Church at Rustico in honor of the fiftieth anniversary of the ordination to the Priesthood of the resident pastor, Rev. John Chaisson, D. D.

A large number of his parishioners in the Rustico Parish and many from his former parish at Indian River were present to do honor to their highly revered priest.

Their Lordships, Bishop O'Leary of Charlottetown, and Bishop Morrison of Antigonish, as well as many clergymen from different parts of the diocese were present. Formal addresses of congratulation and good wishes were presented from the parish of Rustico and from the different communities of the parish as well as one from his former parishioners of Indian River. Each address was accompanied by an appropriate gift.

Dr. Chaisson made a fitting reply to each address noting the invariable kindness he had met with during the whole course of his ministry. He made special reference to his old-time parish of Indian River, his first charge after leaving the University.

After the ceremony in the Church, the visitors and others were sumptuously entertained in the Parochial House of Dr. Chaisson.

Forty-five priests in all were present at the Jubilee.

Father Chaisson was born in Tignish and after his ordination served in the Cathedral and was later appointed rector of Saint Dunstan's University. He was some years later transferred to Indian River, after which he served for a time in the Magdalene Islands. He was twenty-five years in the Rustico Parish.

Four addresses in French and English were presented to the Jubilee, namely: the Parish (in French) and (in English) the Assumption Society and Indian River. The Rev. Father replied in both languages.

Solemn High Mass followed with Father Chaisson as Celebrant; Rev. J. B. Gallant, Deacon; Rev. Fr. Pitre, Sub Deacon; Rev. Fr. P. Walsh, Master of Ceremonies.

Purses were presented by the Charlottetown Parish and the Deanery of the Eastern and Western parts of the Island and also by the Acadians. Fr. Chaisson made replies in French and English.

The pupils of Rustico Convent entertained the visiting priests with a pleasing program.

A party of Tryon United Church accompanied by their pastor Rev. Geo. and Mrs. Somers held a joy ride and picnic on Tuesday, June 19th. Starting in the morning they motored from Tryon to Wilmont, then on to Malpeque, Darley and Sea View where they camped for dinner which was heartily enjoyed by all. Once more joyriding they went through New London, and Stanley, where by the roadside gipsy fashion they had tea. Then away to the cars and joy ride some more. On the trip several members of the party visited such interesting and historic spots as the United Church Malpeque and the Geddie Memorial Church.
