It might be interesting also to know that the present owner of this property has no faith in the existence of spirits, good or bad, and believes that superstition is influenced of the masses, religiously and otherwise."

To read Conan Doyle's late works such as "The Great Awakening" and scientists like Sir Oliver Lodge on spirits, and then to think that only a few of the experienced can get in communication with them and the millions of friends zone before can get no inkling of their spiritual presence, it looks very unreasonable.

A few years ago an old Scotchman we knew said when passing a shady hollow not far from here one dark night, that he met a man with no head on her. If I meet this head with no man on her I will keep you posted.

Since living in this house we have unearthed what might seem to be ghosts to some.
