STEPHEN, N.B., Jan. 3.—"Bun" McLennan's third period goal, at the 14 minute mark, gave the Fredericton Caps a 5-4 victory tonight over St. Croix Maple Leafs in a regular game of the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League. The victory placed Fredericton one point behind the Saint John Beavers, now holding second place in the league standing. Moncton Maroons the other member of the league occupies the top rung.

Drillon Holds Scoring Lead Over Rivals

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (CP)—Moncton Maroons are seeking the services of Hooley Smith, centre star, it was announced tonight by Red Dutton, Manager of New York Americans of the National Hockey League. Dutton said that on his trip to Montreal last week-end he was advised by Frank Calder, N.H.L. President and director of the Amerks, that Maroon club officials had approached him regarding Smith. "They asked Mr. Calder if I was satisfied with the way Smith was playing and when he passed the question on to me, I assured him that I was," said Dutton, who signed Smith this season after he was turned loose by Boston Bruins as a hold-out.

Gorman around Madison Square Garden is that Thomas P. Gorman, President and present coach of Maroons, was willing to part with Leo Gracie, fast-skating centre for the Canadiens, who once scored in a Montreal uniform. However, in Montreal, today, Gorman said "as far as I'm concerned I've never heard of such a deal." "During the last few games with us, Hooley has played his best hockey of the last six or seven seasons and I would not part with him for any amount of money if he was younger," Dutton said. "But Hooley has his home and a business in Montreal and this plus the fact that I am anxious to build the Americans for the future, might persuade me to consider a deal for him with the Maroons." "As for a straight swap, though, that's out. There isn't a player on that team I'd take on an even trade for Hooley. I'd want a first-class forward and a substantial sum of cash."

Wolfville Defeats Port Williams 6-4

Scottish Curlers Lose To Scotians

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Jan. 3.—Nova Scotian curlers won three matches out of four against Scottish curlers tonight, and gave Canada a 3-1 lead as the series for the Strathcona Cup opened. The visitors will tour Canada playing representative rinks. If they win more games than the Canadian rinks, the trophy goes to Scotland. Good Old Days In Hockey Are Recalled

(Canadian Press) SILTON, Sask., Jan. 3.—Lieutenant-Governor A. P. McNab of Saskatchewan attended the official opening of Silton's new curling rink and revealed himself no mean hockey strategist in the days when the rules were elastic. The new rink replaces the one Silton folk built two years ago with baled hay, which fell prey to flames. The lieutenant-governor recalled the days he spent at Alexander, Man., not far from Virden. Both towns had hockey teams and McNab became slightly fed up with the beatings Alexander was taking. So he entered the importing business with Brandon the source of hockey material supply. Four players were imported from Brandon and Mr. McNab related how he kept them under cover in his kitchen until game time. Alexander won the game by a goal margin but Virden put up a great howl when they discovered the Alexander team was "loaded." "I did not worry about that," said Lieutenant-Governor McNab. "We won the game and got the gate receipts which were a big item in those days."

Clancy Has No Comment

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.—Frank (King) Clancy, lately coach of Montreal Maroons in the National Hockey League, declined today to enlarge on his resignation from that post last Thursday. At the time of his resignation he intimated he might have something further to say today, after talking over the situation with his father, the original King Clancy. With the New Year's holiday intervening, Clancy announced today the whole thing was "a closed book" as far as he was concerned. His immediate plans call for a holiday, probably in Florida, for a month or six weeks. "After 15 years, I think it's about time I took a real holiday," he said today.

Win Points As Scoring Race Continues
