The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held last night with Mayor Lidstone in the chair. Councillors Strong, Kelly and Phillips being present. After the minutes of the previous meeting were read by the clerk, Mr. Durant, bills were passed as follows, town paid bills \$18,657.10. Unpaid bills \$4,008.58. Electric light paid bills \$7,070.84. Electric light unpaid bills \$1,822.55.

A motion was passed that the Mayor and Council in conjunction with the President of Board of Trade, Mr. R. B. Richardson make suitable arrangements for the entertaining of the Governor General of Canada on his proposed visit on October 15th.

A resolution accepting the resignation of Mr. H. J. Massy as Town Clerk was passed on motion of Councillor Strong, seconded by Councillor Kelly. Councillor Strong in moving the motion spoke very highly of the efficient manner in which Mr. Massy had carried out his duties for the past thirty years. Mayor Lidstone fully endorsed Councillor Strong, saying that Mr. Massy has been a faithful servant of the town and his example might be followed with advantage by future town clerks.

On motion of Councillor Strong and seconded by Councillor Phillips, Mr. Neil Durant was appointed Town Clerk in Mr. Massy's place. Resolved that a bed for a concrete sidewalk be built from the bridge east of B. W. Robinson's residence, to Harvard Street on the north side of Water Street. Resolved that certain streets be built up to the level of Granville Street. Reports from different committees were read and passed.

A petition was read from rate payers asking that the noise made by the electric light plant be stopped. A motion to deal with the matter was moved by Councillor Kelly and seconded by Councillor Phillips. Tenders be called for fifty tons of Sidney screened coal before October 20, tenders to close on October 8. Meeting adjourned.
