THE MARKET.—The market yesterday was fairly well attended with prices showing little change from previous quotations. Butter sold from 32c to 34c; eggs 28c to 30c; rhubarb 5c per pound and fowl \$1.00. Early vegetables including radishes were offered for sale. In the fish market there were no haddock; all the tables were piled with cod, which sold at 7 cents per lb. A few lobsters at 20 cents per pound. Outside, hay sold at from 75c. to 90c.; oats 70c to 75c.; straw, 50c. to 60c potatoes 35c to 40c. per bus. Young pigs sold at \$15.00 per pair.

HAVING A DELIGHTFUL VISIT.—In a letter from W. F. Newson to a friend in Charlottetown he pays the Guardian officials a high compliment for their promptness in having the daily forwarded to his various non-permanent destinations. Mr. Newson is now on his fourth month of sight-seeing and in all this time the Guardian is received with wonderful regularity. On June 2nd, early in the day Guardian of May 31 was received on the Catskill Mountains, one hundred and fifty miles north of New York city. He also makes the following remarks concerning Boston and New York, with their elevated rails and their subways and tube laid rails under the Hudson River and their sixty-five storey high towers, which are no doubt artificially grand, but for natural scenery, grandeur and beauty one might visit the Catskill Mountains with its rich valleys, where one farmer alone will have 100 milk cows on his farm. 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DR. FRASER HARRIS AGAIN HEADS MEDICAL COUNCIL

HALIFAX, June 7.—Professor Fraser Harris has been in Ottawa representing Dalhousie University at the ninth annual meeting of the Medical Council of Canada, being reappointed chairman of the education committee of the council. The council decided that its examinations should be held at Moncton and Halifax in October, 1921, and at Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver in June, 1922.

The following examiners from the Maritime Provinces were appointed. Surgery—Dr. John Stewart. Pathology—Prof. A. G. Nicholls. Hygiene—Dr. W. H. Hattie. Obstetrics and Gynaecology—Dr. C. S. Morton. Medicine—Dr. S. Skinner, of St. John.

It will be noted that four of the examiners are from Halifax and that the four are all members of the Faculty of Medicine of Dalhousie University.
