Summerside on Tuesday, and will come from there to Dalhousie and Campbellton, N.B. before returning to the central provinces. He will preach in St. James Church tomorrow evening.

Recalls Malpeque Visit No stranger to Prince Edward Island, Dr. Inkster spoke enthusiastically of a holiday he and his family spent at Malpeque about a year ago, of which they retain very pleasant impressions.

He spoke also in appreciation of the Red Cross drive and the coming Victory Loan campaign. "We are in full sympathy with these movements," he said, "as we are with the campaign for community service. But surely we must not forget the church. This is the first appeal the Presbyterian Church in Canada has made since the Union in 1925."

Dr. Inkster is secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada Foundation Fund, which has as its objective the establishment of a trust fund for continuing and assisting the work of the church, and liquidating the present church debt. This effort was authorized by the General Assembly in June, 1942.

Plan of Campaign The plan, in general, is that every man, woman and child in the Presbyterian church will be asked to contribute 10 cents a year for every year of his or her age. For example a man of 40 contributes four dollars; a woman of 30 contributes three dollars; a child of five, 50 cents. If, for some reason, this might be hardship, they will be asked to contribute what they can afford and others who are able to contribute more, may do so, but the general idea is that every Presbyterian, young and old, have some part in this great inspired movement.

Dr. Inkster, as secretary of the committee, will visit a number of persons in each community on a social names list and each will be asked for larger donations. Special features being arranged in connection with the drive will include dedicatory services in every Presbyterian church in Canada.

The campaign was begun last year for the first of February and will continue until the end of April. Letters were sent to ministers and session clerks requesting the names and addresses of the 14,000 Presbyterians in Canada, and already 75 per cent of these have been received. Papers explaining the movement are sent by mail to every member and adherent. The treasurer of the fund is Mr. J. A. MacLeod, president of the Bank of Nova Scotia.

Born in Orkney Islands Dr. Inkster who is one of the "best known figures in the Presbyterian Church," is a native of the Orkney Islands. He came to Canada with his parents when a youth, residing in Toronto where he received his education. Later he served as pastor of the famous Knox Presbyterian Church in that city for nineteen years, retiring three years ago. Since then he travelled to New Zealand and Australia, supplying St. John's Scotch church in New Zealand for ninth months and other churches in those countries before returning to Canada.

Largely Attended Meeting Indorses New Hospital For Eastern Kings Co.

At a meeting held in St. Mary's Hall, Souris on March 16, it was voted by the enthusiastic body of citizens representing communities from St. Peter's Bay to East Point that Eastern Kings County should have a hospital of its own, to be located at Souris.

This general meeting which had been preceded by earlier meetings of a provisional hospital committee appointed by the Souris Board of Trade met to hear reports of the provisional committee and to decide on the basis of these as to whether the hospital project should be proceeded with.

Mr. R. C. MacLean, chairman of the provisional committee presided and gave a comprehensive resume of the work of the committee. In addition to asking the secretary, M.J. MacQuaid to read the minutes of previous meetings.

The chairman reported that the temporary committee had decided that an original amount of \$7,500, should be raised if the project was to get away to a good start, and it was decided that the committee should be increased rather than decreased in the years ahead. And it was pointed out that the other hospital in King's County, at Montague, received a grant of one hundred dollars per year from the Provincial Government.

An unanimous show of hands approved the temporary committee's report and a meeting was called to be held at the hospital project. A nominating committee consisting of P.E. Holland, T. J. Kichham, Dr. A. E. Smallwood and J. M. MacQuaid was appointed.

The complete executive of the Hospital Association will consist of the above officers together with twelve representatives from the village and rural districts of Eastern Kings. The following were nominated and elected with five members still to be appointed: James Robertson, Stewart MacIntyre, Mrs. S. J. Rose, William Howlett, Edwin Reid, Chester McGugh and T. J. Kichham.

On the motion of Edwin Reid seconded by N. H. Eshard, the meeting approved a resolution asking the Provincial Government for a maintenance grant in similar proportion to that received by other hospitals.

A. F. MacQuaid recalling that Souris had one of the earliest hospitals in the province, the Marine Hospital built at Souris shortly after Prince Edward Island entered confederation, suggested that the hospital executive contact the Department of Marine and Fisheries to see if a grant towards the erection and maintenance of the new hospital which would also serve as a Marine Hospital could not be obtained.

Many other prominent citizens of Eastern Kings including James G. Dingwell, R. L. Burge, D. J. Mullin, Ronald McPhee, Henry McDonald and Edwin Reid expressed themselves as being ready to do anything to make it a success.

Dr. A. A. MacDonald of Souris, the only resident physician between East Point and St. Peter's Bay told of the grave medical situation in Eastern Kings where not only the absence of hospital accommodation but the insufficient number of doctors made for inadequate medical service in practically the whole district. He was strongly in support of a new hospital both for itself and the incentive it would be for a young surgeon to settle in our midst.

A communication from Dr. R. J. MacDonald of St. Peter's Bay, the only other doctor of Eastern Kings was read to the meeting expressing his regret at being unable to attend but endorsing the hospital movement and assuring it of his whole-hearted support otherwise.

The secretary announced that up to the present time a total of \$4800, had been pledged in a number of schools towards the erection of a hospital, with a number of districts still to be heard from, and with the town of Souris not yet canvassed. It was felt that the minimum objective of \$7,500 would be raised and probably exceeded with the whole-hearted co-operation of all.

It was moved by A. F. Peters and seconded by Henry MacQuaid that the hospital executive apply for an act of incorporation under the name of the Souris Hospital. This motion was carried by unanimous approval of the meeting.

Some discussion followed as to the advisability of buying and remodeling or providing a new building for the hospital. The matter was finally left in the hands of the directors to build if at all possible but if not to provide adequate accommodation otherwise.

A canvass will get underway soon in all districts of Eastern Kings when residents and former members of the hospital will be called upon to subscribe generously to this most worthy project and to provide the Eastern end of the island with an up to date and modern hospital. The furnishing, rooms, or the equipping of surgical and X Ray departments by Institutes, clubs or individuals in proportion to that received by other hospitals.

Steady Increase In Air Traffic

Mar. Central Airways, Ltd., carries a total of 1979 passengers on their services during the year 1942. 3,850 passengers came to and 3,964 left the island by air. The balance of air traffic is made up of passengers between Charlottetown and Summerside, Moncton and St. John, and between Charlottetown and the Magdalen Islands plus a few special charter trips.

The above figures were released last night by the Maritime Rogers, supervisor of the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau. Mr. Rogers stated that he did not know whether there would be resumption of a Sunday air service this year, but that in view of the increasing volume of military and business mail being handled without delay this matter should be given very serious consideration by the Post-Office Department.

Tiny Warships Train For Grim Game At Sea

MOTOR LAUNCH, March 19 - (CP) - It's a grim game of hare and hounds that is being played on the North Atlantic, as three trim Royal Canadian Navy motor launches are busy building up wind and muscle in preparation for their part in the fight.

Regularly they stream out of an East Coast Canadian port, in the motor launch leaving a kennel, in company with a gaunt Royal Navy submarine to learn under actual battle conditions just how to track down and kill U-boats.

Motor launches are the hounds in this war game - the submarine is the hare with all the elusiveness of a rabbit puz the scrapping ability of a cornered timber wolf.

But let's stick with the hounds first as they face a choppy winter sea, the playing field on which part of the battle of the Atlantic may be won.

Trim and speedy, they are merely those sleek cruisers that in peace days loafed off Canada's coast, the motor launch and her crew. They're leaner, longer and tougher in their battle dress. Death charges take up the space once occupied by dolly of the motor launch, fishing poles, poke over the rails, and the chugging, unburied motors of the 30's have been replaced by the roaring, sea-going engines of the 40's.

They're the flowerlets of the Royal Canadian Navy, but their footwork is tricky and their power enough of a wallop to make U-boats think twice about challenging them.

Their job will not be so concerned with protecting convoys - the slower destroyers and corvettes do that - but in working with R.C.A.F. aircraft in tracking down and smashing enemy U-boats.

The warships will carry the fight to the water's surface, authorities believe this might answer at least part of the answer to the U-boat problem.
