Another Letter.

Last November, in reading over the Patriot, I noticed in very large headlines: "Action Taken by Premier Bell with Respect to our Claims Against Canada." I thought, reading that announcement, that the whole question had been settled and that, so far as it was concerned at least, we had reached our political millennium. The type was larger and blacker than the letters they had used when the word came back that we had received the \$100,000 yearly increase. I found it simply to be a summary of Premier Bell's correspondence which he had forwarded to the press in the form of a "press release." That, it appears, is as far as the matter as he had ever got. The big display in the Patriot was to announce that he had written another letter. The length of this letter is marvellous. I noticed that both the gentlemen to whom it was addressed have since resigned; whether this letter had anything to do with their resignation or not I don't know. But I would not blame them if it did.

A Prohibition Story.

Speaking of Prohibition, that reminds me of the Budget debate last year, when my hon. friend from second Prince (Mr. A. C. Saunders) went into the matter very exhaustively, and displayed such a knowledge of the financial questions of liquor that I was almost inclined to believe he was the official "taster" of the Prohibition Commission, such a character as they used to have in the old days. I have since heard, and perhaps my hon. friend from Morell (Hon. Mr. Cox) has heard, that there has been a change in that position. For the benefit of my hon. friend from Morell I will tell a little Prohibition story about one of the other provinces. At a meeting of the government in this province to which I refer, the question of the quality of the Government liquor came up for discussion. Upon the suggestion of one gentleman present, a Committee was appointed to investigate the matter. The first to go on the committee was a trader, a gentleman who dealt, among other things, in fish. Then a newspaper man, newspapermen know a little about everything and they are supposed to know a little about liquor too. That was the unfortunate part of it. Before the committee got together one of them was so impatient to get the matter settled—so ardent was he in the cause of Temperance—that he went down to the vendors and got a "supply" and took it home and analysed it for himself. What happened? The poor man was sick in bed for a week. I hope that will be a lesson to this Government, if they have any intention of interfering with the Prohibition Commission.

A Bogus Surplus.

The financial question, touched upon in the Speech, will be taken up fully in the Budget debate, and we will then deal with it. I notice however, that we are to have the usual "surplus." This seems to be the usual "surplus" of the Premier's manoeuvring; the thing which he must have by hook or crook. I have said already in this House, that in my opinion a surplus of paper is a valueless thing in itself. Its value depends entirely upon how it is arrived at. If I have four cents in my pocket and I owe forty dollars, my little pocket surplus is not of very much significance. It is not a very TRUTHFUL surplus. If my hon. friends have a surplus this year, as they had last

The School Lands.

The Premier referred in his communication to the school lands. That is a perfectly good claim. But is my hon. friend aware that in 1913 a memorial upon this subject was very carefully prepared after the most exhaustive research by the Attorneys General of the three Maritime Provinces: Mr. Daniels for the Marry Government of Nova Scotia; Mr. Grimmer of the Supreme Court bench of New Brunswick; and the present Chief Justice of this province. That memorial is now on file at Ottawa, and my hon. friend cannot improve on it. All that is required of him is not the writing of gossipy letters to the Premier, but to back up the memorial which has already been prepared and on file. It seems to me that the most important claim has been omitted altogether; that is, our claim for having no public lands. This practically only occurred in 1912. It is well known that this province and Manitoba are the only provinces which have not published their land claims. We receive about forty cents per head as compensation for the land, and Manitoba, up to 1912, received about the same. Then in that year Manitoba was given an increase, raising the amount to about \$1.00 or \$1.25 per head. There is no reason, when they received that increase, that we should not have received it too. This is the
