ARRANGEMENTS have been completed whereby Rev. J. W. McConnell, pastor of Grace church and Rev. G. M. During their absence of three months they will visit Rome, Naples, Switzerland, France and on returning they purpose being present at the Ecumenical (Methodist) Conference which will be held in London during the month of September. Mr. Ewen McMillan of the Guelph Agricultural College delivered a highly interesting lecture at North River Hall on Thursday evening, 7th inst. His subject was "Soil Fertility" and the lecturer handled it in an instructive and original manner. That the farmers of North River appreciated the lecture, is evident by the fact they have asked Mr. McMillan, to give them another evening's entertainment about the last of the present month. We bespeak a full house on this occasion as the farmers are not afforded a treat of this nature very often.

As usual a full house greeted Mr. Fullerton in the lecture room of St. James last evening. The lecture like its predecessors was interesting and instructive in the highest degree and though it lasted almost two hours none of the audience took any note of the passing time, but would willingly have waited longer, so intense was their interest and attention. The course described was the march from Blomfontein to Pretoria and the part taken up by the Canadians, especially on that march of 400 miles during which they were in 23 different engagements. They made the march in 35 days with rests on the way of 10 days, making the time between the two places 45 days. The arrival at Pretoria was on June 5th. Pretoria is a small city comparing favorably with several Canadian towns. Its new buildings are magnificent, the older part of the city being much further behind the times.
